SUCH JOY IN THIS PLACE

Dear People of God,

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

What a joy to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ with you in this the Great 50 Days of Easter. We have followed the footfalls of our Savior through the season of Lent and to the hill of Golgotha. We have wept with the disciples and experienced the pain of his followers who believed all hope was lost with the crucifixion on Good Friday. And now, here, we stand in defiance of death for the great joy of an empty tomb and the promised power of God as the stone was rolled away, sharing with us once again that death has no power over the creator and author of life. Alleluia!

Holy Week was full of surprises. How wonderful to celebrate the First Communion of 22 fifth graders during Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and again, on the First Sunday after Easter. We give thanks for the gift of musicians that showered God with praise throughout the celebration of Holy Week and into Easter. Maundy Thursday brought a ritual of individual forgiveness of sins along with foot-washing and kneeling for communion. Good Friday welcomed the story of the passion told in mime and a traditional tenebrae service at 7 p.m. that evening. And Easter – well, God brought great joy this year – lilies and trumpets and baptisms…thanks be to God!

There is much to tell you about the days ahead. First, we give thanks to God for the gift of the reconfigured sanctuary. In March, I told you that we would return to the traditional format after Easter...I want to temper that statement with comments from several of you – sharing that you love the new arrangement. Well, you will have the opportunity to enjoy the sanctuary space as it is for a few more weeks. I expect to rearrange the sanctuary again over Memorial Day weekend or possibly June 1 at the latest. We will return to a somewhat traditional format along with a rearrangement of the altar area up-front. Come and see what the Holy Spirit will do – I am still waiting to hear the final outcome!

New members will be received on May 11. Several families and individuals have come forward ready to commit themselves to this place and to share in the grace, power, and care of our community. I ask for your prayers as these individuals join us in mission and in ministry.

We will celebrate the service of confirmation on Sunday, May 18, during both the 9 and 10:45 services, with the students choosing to be confirmed at their respective services. What great power the rite of confirmation will have within the context of the communities worship in which these students have been nurtured in the faith. Yes, there will be lots of people. Yes, the services will be different. But, for Ascension, it will be a wonderful gift for all to share in the joy of this day.

Finally, by the time you read this, the Call Team will have met face-to-face with two of the three candidates who God has entrusted to us to consider for call as pastor to this place. The Call Team expects to gather the week of May 4 to discern a final candidate recommendation for the Church Council to bless and then announce a weekend in May or June for an introduction of the candidate and their family to the congregation. Keep watching for the announcement.

Such joy in this place! Come and see what God is doing!

SPIRITUAL SPRING CLEAN-UP

Spring has sprung. At last, at last! We are so grateful for nicer weather - for sunshine, for warmth, for budding trees and growing grass. My 18-month old son in particular is enjoying being outside and exploring the world around him (He wasn't terribly mobile the last time the weather was this nice).

But whenever we are in our backyard, I look around and realize how much we didn't get done in terms of fall clean-up. When the layers of snow finally all melted, I discovered that our lawn was matted with dead leaves that we never had a chance to rake. There were various twigs and small branches littering the grass. Random papers and plastic from the neighbors' trash had blown into our driveway and front yard. So while we are outside enjoying spring, my husband Andy and I are also hard at work cleaning up all of the things that have accumulated to get our property ready for us to enjoy this summer.

As we enter into this Easter season (Easter lasts for fifty days, you know!), I was thinking that our lives as disciples are a lot like spring. Theoretically, we spend the forty days of Lent doing some of this spiritual pruning and clean-up as we reflect on our lives and try more deliberately to reflect Jesus' model. And then we come to Easter morning, and we rejoice at the new life that springs from the empty tomb into our lives. The warmth of Christ's love bursts upon us, and we are so thankful, ready to enjoy it.

This new life and love comes, like spring, as a gift from God – there is nothing we can do to make it come, even though we sometimes wish we could. There is nothing we need to do to bring this new life about - God is the one that brings it about, but that doesn't mean that we can't participate in it. Just because Easter life comes as God's gift doesn't mean that we don't have a chance to partner with God in what God is doing - in our individual lives, in our congregation, in the life of the world around us. As we celebrate the abundant life that Christ's life, death, and resurrection make possible, we are invited to look around us and see what we can do to help God's kingdom to come. As followers of Jesus, we do this by tending to our own spiritual ground – cleaning up the dead leaves of apathy and pulling the growing weeds of anger or bitterness or resentment before they have a chance to really take root and spread. We come to worship, we read God's word, we pray, we give. We plant the seeds of love and grace and mercy for ourselves and the people around us. We sit up and take notice of the needs of the world around us, and then take action: feeding the hungry, tending the sick, clothing the naked, loving our neighbors wherever we find them. And all the while, we give thanks for this Easter life, grateful that God calls us to work together in tending to it and helping it to grow.

May you enjoy and grow in the new life God gives us!

MY GOD MOMENT

I believe I have had several God moments in my life. I pray daily to God for the forgiveness of my sins, blessings, and the well-being of family and friends, among other things. I have noticed as life's stress mounts, my prayers become more intense in asking God for help, guidance, and, in my mind, some miracles.

My oldest daughter Cara was born weighing a little over four pounds, causing the pediatrician to keep her in the hospital. After about a week, Sharon and I were told Cara wasn't doing well and she was going to be transported to Children's Memorial Hospital in Chicago. This was a Saturday afternoon. By 10 p.m., we were told they didn't think they could do anything for Cara because she was in such distress. I will never forget calling Pastor shortly thereafter inquiring about having Cara baptized. Around 2:30 Sunday morning, a pastor from the Chicago area arrived, and Cara was baptized while in the neonatal unit. Miraculously, Cara stabilized that next week, and had heart surgery about 12 days later to correct several heart defects. Cara has had a few more heart surgeries since and another yet to be performed down the road. By the Grace of God, Cara will be 35 this fall. To me, this was one of God's miracles.

I have had other God Moments, including finding a great job in a great community after being unemployed for nine months.

God has blessed me and my family many times over the years; he has answered my prayers many times. I continue to pray daily thanking God for his many blessings. God's blessings to all.


MAY 14 CONCERT AND HOSTS NEEDED

FREE CLASS: THE STROKE EXPERIENCE: DIAGNOSIS, TREATMENT, AND RECOVERY

ProHealth Care is offering this FREE class on Wednesday, May 21, at the West Wood Health and Fitness Center, in Pewaukee. There will be interactive displays open from 5-6 p.m. The program will be from 6-7 p.m. Neurologist Brian Chapman, MD, and interventional radiologist Erik Olson, MD, will discuss the steps that a stroke patient will experience during emergency treatment. You'll learn about the tests that will be completed, treatment options available, and how physicians make treatment decisions. The neurology specialist will discuss how the clot-busting drug TPA works, explain how physicians remove clots that cause a stroke, and outline the steps involved in your recovery.

BLOOD DRIVE AND ORGAN DONATION REGISTRY

We are having another Blood Drive and Organ Donation Registry on Saturday, May 31, from 8 a.m.-noon, in West Hall. We had a great response at our last blood drive with 31 donors present. That donation will save up to 81 local community patient lives. Let's do it again! Sign up for an appointment at: www.bcw.edu/ascension. Appointments are encouraged, but walk-ins are also welcome. The drive is open to family and friends. Find out more on the next page.

Blood is the essence of life, and to give selflessly can make you feel more connected to your community and to the world around you. It's a fulfilling, powerful, and enriching experience to know that your donation could save lives.

Unfortunately, fewer than 5% of people who are eligible to donate actually do. Imagine the lives that could be touched by your gift. It's a quick, simple, and amazing way to give back to our community!

Eligibility

Anyone who is at least 17 years old, weighs a minimum of 110 lbs. and is in generally good health can donate blood. The entire process takes about an hour and all blood types are needed. Donors should bring a photo ID.

Most medications are acceptable. The following are unacceptable medications: Proscar (finasteride), Avodart, Jalyn (dutasteride), Propecia (finasteride), Accutane, Absorica, Amnesteem, Claravis, Myorisan, Sotret, Zenatane (isotretinoin), Soriatane (acitretin), Tegison (etretinate), growth hormone from human pituitary glands, insulin from cows (bovine or beef insulin), Hepatitis B Immune Globulin (Note: This is different from the hepatitis B vaccine), Coumadin (warfarin), experimental medications.

Antibiotics: You can donate three days after finishing antibiotics for an infection (bacterial or viral). You can donate if you are taking antibiotics to prevent an infection, for example, following dental procedures or for acne. Antibiotics for acne do not disqualify you from donating.

Dental work: You can donate if there is no infection.

Flu vaccination: You can donate if you are feeling well.

Heart disease: Most donors with a history of heart disease that are feeling well and do not have any restrictions may be eligible to donate. Please be prepared to discuss your specific condition with a Donor Specialist.

Infections: You must be infection-free.

Injections/Vaccinations: Certain injections and vaccinations require a wait before donating. Please bring the name of the injection or vaccination and the date it was administered.

Menstruation: Women can donate during their periods.

Piercings: Ear or body piercing using single-use, sterile equipment is acceptable.

Pregnancy: Women who are pregnant should not donate. Please wait to donate until 6 weeks after giving birth. Women who are breast-feeding are eligible to donate.

Tattoos: Restrictions concerning tattoos have changed. If your tattoo was applied by a licensed facility in Wisconsin, you can donate blood. If your tattoo was applied by an unlicensed facility or a facility outside Wisconsin, we require a 12-month waiting period from the time the tattoo was applied.

Travel: If you have traveled to a malaria area, you may not donate until 12 months after your return.

Cancer: Certain cancers require a 5-year wait after treatments. Please be prepared to discuss your specific type of cancer with a Donor Specialist.



Knits Wits is a group of women from Ascension and the community who enjoy knitting, crocheting, and looming, and want to help others. Our purpose is to foster friendship among our members. Our mission is to help keep the less-fortunate warm one stitch at a time, and so we make hats and other winter accessories for charity. We expanded our mission this year to include infants at Ascension. We make hat-booties-and-mitten sets for the New Life Ministry and create Angel Blankets for families grieving the death of an infant.

Our accomplishments this year include:

- 12 charity knit-a-thons
- Two new missions this year: New Life Ministry and Angel Blankets
- Our first annual Hat Sale raised \$1,140.
 We purchased 2,332 knit items for charity!

- We created 1,732 hats and bought 1660, so our HAT total came to 3,392!
- Our grand total was 4,245 items donated to charity, including cowls, scarves, capes, mittens, and slippers!
- We donated \$300 to charities for their general clothing funds.
- 40% of attendees are not members of Ascension, which is evidence of our successful community outreach!





Hope Center is a non-profit organization that has been serving the basic needs of financial assistance, food, and clothing in Waukesha County for more than twenty years.

By the Numbers:

Clothing Shop

- 2,704 unduplicated individuals have visited the Clothing Shop 8,814 times. Approximately 45% of all visits were for children.
- 29,054 articles of clothing were distributed, in addition, 2,765 pieces of underwear and 3,689 pairs of socks.

Day Center

- 390 unduplicated individuals have visited the Day Center 4,430 times.
- 3,641 breakfasts and 4,484 lunches were served.

Meal Program
