O give thanks to the LORD, call on God's name, make known God's deeds among the peoples.

Sing to the LORD, sing praises to God, tell of all God's wonderful works.

1 Chronicles 16:8-9

As Thanksgiving Day approaches, pastors everywhere write corny, predictable newsletter articles or devotionals about how we should be thankful and count our blessings. I have to tell you, this article will be no exception. This time of year, as we enter the holiday season, we tend to be a little more thoughtful and little more generous. This is a wonderful sign of the season. However, sometimes we can focus on our immediate household and not fully connect with relatives and friends who live far away. As we all know, life can be painfully and unpredictably short. This holiday season, let us make every effort to reach out to loved ones and family members. Most importantly, we should reach out to those with whom we might have a strained relationship. We have no idea what the future holds. Therefore, it implores us to be with family as often as possible. Here's a Thanksgiving story of a father who is challenged by his family's situation and is willing to go to extreme measures.

A man in Tampa calls his daughter, Sue, in California just before Thanksgiving and announces to her that he is divorcing her mother after fifty years of marriage. The daughter exclaims, "What? You can't do that!"

Sisters and brothers, let this lighthearted story serve as inspiration to motivate us to reach out to family members and loved ones. Let us make a concerted effort to reconnect with family members – especially if you're not on speaking terms. I know it can be severely challenging, but let bygones be bygones and agree to disagree, even if it means you have to say "sorry" first. This doesn't mean that we forget the past; but, rather, invite a more peaceful future. After all, we never know how much time we have left to make amends. So, this holiday season, let's seize every opportunity to repair broken relationships. That way, as we gather at our feasts, we can enjoy God's abundant blessings with hearts that are open and relationships that are restored. Now sisters and brothers, restored does not necessarily mean that the relationship will be perfect or overflowing with hugs and kisses. But the relationship will no longer be broken and will at least be on the path toward healing. What an amazing way to honor God this Thanksgiving - by living into a spirit of reconciliation!

Calling a new pastor to walk alongside a congregation is always an adventure. And with every adventure, comes new moments of discovery and opportunities for growth and for understanding.



YOUR COUNCIL AT WORK

We welcomed Pastor Angela to Ascension at the September council. It is truly a blessing to have both Pastor Angela and Pastor Chris at the council meetings, and it is nice to see a partnership at the table again.

We discussed the greatly successful Fall Festival. It was nice to hear visitors to Ascension talk about the community of our church and the joy of the event. It was a great event! A big *thank you* to all of those that were involved.

The Budget Team has been meeting weekly to discuss the 2015 budget. Council has unanimously decided on the budget for 2015, and this will be available for review prior to the Annual Congregational Meeting. We are going to have a budget listening session on Sunday, Nov. 2, between the 9 and 10:45 worship services. This will give church members a chance to ask questions of the council and financial development teams. Please attend this session if you have any questions about the budget.

We are always in need of volunteers to fill leadership roles. Do you have an interest in council, or maybe you would like to lead a wing? Maybe you're a great recruiter and would like to take on a leadership development role? Whatever it is, please don't sit back and think "Well, what if?" Come talk to anyone that is in leadership and we will find a home for you. Ascension needs leaders like you!

A brief reminder: council approved the following changes to the constitution and bylaws last spring. These changes will need to be adopted by the congregation at the November 9 annual meeting.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

C6.05

b. The secretary of this congregation shall submit a copy of the resolution to the synodical bishop and shall mail <u>or email</u> a copy of the resolution to voting members of this congregation. This notice shall be submitted within 10 days after the resolution has been adopted.

d. If this congregation, after consultation, still desires to terminate its relationship, such action may be taken at a legally called and conducted special meeting by a two-thirds majority of the voting members present, at which meeting the bishop of the synod or an authorized representative shall be present. Notice of the meeting shall be mailed or emailed to all voting members at least 10 days in advance of the meeting. Unless he or she is a voting member of the congregation, the bishop and the bishop's designees, if any, shall have voice but not vote at the meeting.

C10.03.

Notice of all meetings of this congregation shall be given at the services of worship during the two preceding weeks and by mail or email, including the anticipated agenda, to all voting members at least 10 days in advance of the date of the meeting. The posting of such notice in the regular mail, with the regular postage affixed or paid, sent to the last known address of such members shall be sufficient.

C17.04

This constitution may be amended to bring any section into conformity with a section or sections, either required or not required, of the Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as most recently amended by the Church-wide Assembly. Such amendments may be approved by a simple majority vote of those voting members present and voting at any legally called meeting of the congregation without presentation at a prior meeting of the congregation, provided that the Congregation Council has submitted by mail or email notice to the congregation of such an amendment or amendments, together with the council's recommendations, at least 30 days prior to the meeting. Upon the request of two percent of the voting members of the congregation, the Congregation Council shall submit such notice. Following the adoption of an amendment, the secretary of the congregation shall submit a copy thereof to the synod. Such provisions shall become effective immediately following a vote of approval.

The following are Bylaws changes:

C11.02.01

The term of office for officers shall begin on May 1 February 1 through April 30 January 31. During the period between election and beginning the term, the officers shall engage in preparatory activities to ensure a smooth transition.

Our last order of business was to approve the addition of four new members, the release of 16 members and transfer of seven members to other congregations.

The council passed the following changes to the By-Laws that will be brought to the congregation at the next Congregational Meeting:

C13.01.01 Administrative Leadership Teams

Administrative leadership teams shall be appointed by the Congregation Council as follows:

Communications Team

Financial Development Team

Leadership Development Team

Facilities Team

The leader for each administrative team shall be appointed by the Congregation Council. The administrative teams shall be coordinated by the Director of Operations, who shall be appointed by the Congregation Council. Team Leaders and the Director of Operations shall be appointed by the Congregation Council for a term of two years. None shall be elected members of the Council.

C13.02.01 Ministries Leadership Teams

Ministries leadership teams shall be appointed by the Congregation Council as follows:

Joyful Worship Team

Spiritual Growth Team

Caring Relationship Team

Mission Outreach Team

The leader for each ministries leadership team shall be appointed by the Congregation Council. The ministries leadership teams shall be coordinated by the Director of Ministries, who shall be appointed by the Congregation Council. Team Leaders and the Director of Ministries shall be appointed by the Congregation Council for a term of two years. None shall be elected members of the Council.

MEET THE ASCENSION HANDBELLS

Heidi Bischmann, Handbell Choir Director

I'd like to introduce you to the Ascension Handbells – not the musician ringers who make up our small group, but the actual handbells and chimes.

Ascension owns five octaves of Malmark Handbells and five octaves of Malmark Choirchimes®. Nice, right? But there is so much more.

Over the last 14 or 15 years, the handbells and chimes have been gifted to Ascension or purchased in loving memory of, in honor of, and/or in support of our growing and vibrant music program by Ascension members, family, and friends.

The first three-octave set of chimes was donated in honor of former members Greg and Sue Harper around the year 1999-2000. The original set of handbells came in 2001 in memory of my mom and fellow ringer, Nanci Schwarzenbacher. Through the years, we have been fortunate to add to our equipment list and have rounded out our set of 61 bells and 61 chimes at five octaves each.

If asked, you might say that the bells are made of brass. Most likely, you would not like the sound if they were made of brass. Instead, Malmark craftspeople transform raw bronze (approximate proportions of 80% copper and 20% tin) into musical instruments of beauty and purity of tone. In the hands of bellringers, that beauty is released to ring out in joyful worship and praise to God.

Developed in 1982, the Choirchime® instrument consists of a square aluminum tube with comfortable, rounded exterior corners to produce the purest and cleanest sound. Shape does matter. In order to create the purest tone, the tube must have 90° angles to avoid undesirable, untuned overtones and extraneous "buzzing" vibrations. The chimes are rung gently, and are not meant to be very loud. A variety of techniques are used to produce different sounds from the instruments – including ring, pluck, let vibrate, mallet, martellato, shake, lift, echo, brush damp, mallet roll, ring touch, swing, thumb damp, tap pluck, bell tree, and table land damp.

Currently, 15 musicians ring in the Handbell Choir. Musical and technical skills are taught and friendships are developed through the team effort of our small group. Various levels of music allow for differences in musical ability and number of ringers at any given time. We share our musical regularly in worship, occasional concerts, education sessions including "summer bell camp," and Mission Outreach events each year.

The handbell choir is open to participants from 7th grade to adult, with some experience reading music. We rehearse Wednesday evenings, from 6–7:15 p.m., September through May. New members are always welcome! For more information, contact Heidi Bischmann, hbischmann@gmail.com or 414-305-7812.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

DISTINCTIVE CHRISTIAN FORMATION OPPORTUNITIES

I have had a lot of families ask me the difference between the two Sunday School times 9 and 10:45 a.m. What is offered at either is distinct. Here is a synopsis of what we do at each Christian formation time slot.

9 a.m. Children's Church

This September, we began a new curriculum called Children's Church. In this model, students begin in worship, stay through the children's message, and then head to East Hall for a large group experience. Once the Pastor finishes the sermon, the students return to worship and join their family for Communion and Sending.

We have children from ages three to eleven participate in Children's Church. The curriculum is directed toward younger children (under 4th grade); however, it does include activities for children of all ages. (Unfortunately, at this time, we do not have the volunteer power to lead all of the suggested activities/games). Some of the older kids enjoy assisting the little learners in completing projects, which is an excellent way for them to demonstrate Christian discipleship and service. However, it is important to note that 4th and 5th graders are at a good age to stay in worship, if they choose, and listen to the sermon. Doing so will provide families with the opportunity to talk about the Bible readings and sermon together after worship.

As I noted above, we need more volunteers to make this model of Sunday School all that it can be. The commitment is small, but the reward of forming relationships with the children is priceless. If you can help, please contact me at Jennifer@ascensionelca.org.

10:45 a.m. FaithWeaver

At 10:45 a.m., we use the Faith-Weaver curriculum. This second model begins the same as the 9 a.m. model. Children begin in church and leave for class after the children's message. Students meet their teacher by grade in the narthex and walk together to their classroom in the Spiritual Growth wing. This is a more traditional Sunday School setting. Classes have a lesson each week. FaithWeaver runs on a 3 year scope and sequence (a fancy way of saying they go through the Bible in 3 years). Then families pick up their kids outside of their classroom once worship is over.

CRASH: YOUTH MINISTRY IS FOR ALL AGES

Passing faith from generation to generation in our world needs new structures for congregations to be effective. This new model of ministry must include ministry with and between all of the generations, not for or by only one or two of the generations. In other words, in order for congregations to effectively grow across the generations in the twenty-first century, the gifts of all people and all generations must be acknowledged and welcomed.

Given the real differences between generations, acknowledging the differences will lead to:

- A healthier sense of life together in community, where health is gauged by safe, trusting, and respectful relationships
- More effective communication between persons, where communication is understood as a mutual, reciprocal, and civil enterprise as well as a medium of God's Spirit.

Effective communication between persons of different generations is a clear path to more effective ministry together, and the practice of ministry together is a central part of the call that God places upon all of God's people.

Enter cross-generational ministry. Cross-generational ministry is not another program, but rather a ministry principle that intends to provide opportunities for adults to spend quality time with young people, where they gather in spaces defined by equity, mutuality, and reciprocity. Cross-generational ministry takes seriously that interactions between the generations happen as "brothers and sisters in Christ."

There is a lot that can masquerade as cross-generational ministry that, in actuality, amounts to not much more than a devaluing gesture, particularly to the younger generations. There is an appearance that the gifts, voices, and leadership of the younger generations is welcomed, accepted, and valued, when in reality they are not.

It should be reasonably obvious that cross-generational ministry is not simply a case of adults "allowing" or "expecting" young people to attend or help with events planned by adults. Rather, cross-generational ministry deeply and thoroughly involves young people from beginning to end and respects their involvement at all levels. It must be ministry with and between all of the generations, not to or for, or even by, any one generation.

So how are we doing things differently here at Ascension? For starters, students and adult leaders are invited into ministry development at every stage. We ask students and leaders what they'd love to be a part of and then together we try and craft ministry experiences that reflect that shared vision.

So what does this look like at Ascension? Throughout Ascension's youth ministry, you will see students engaged alongside adult leaders doing mission projects together, students and leaders together leading games and faith discussions, students and adult leaders together assisting with planning and implementation of service learning opportunities, retreats, mission trips, fun events, and more. You'll also see youth actively participating in Care Ministries, Joyful Worship, and in activites with our Mission Outreach partners. I remember when I was in grade school stopping everything we were doing in class at 11 a.m., on November 11. We would observe two minutes of silence as a sign of respect for the mil-

lions of lives lost in WWI. I remember the principal's booming voice coming over the intercom explaining why he was interrupting our class time, so I knew it was important. After observing silence, our teacher would talk to us about Veterans Day, undoubtedly ask if any of us had family who had served, and then talk about honoring our veterans and the freedoms we enjoy because of their sacrifices. I would run home after school with a picture of a flag or a poem written about patriotism. I couldn't wait for my dad to get home from work to thank him for his service and beg him to get the box out of the attic with his Marine memorabilia.

I'm not sure when or why this tradition stopped being observed in the schools. I fear that to many of us go about our everyday lives without giving much thought to the thousands of men and women that are standing at the ready, for us, or Diane Maasz, Military Family Ministry Leader

to the millions that have gone before them, fighting brutal battles in unthinkable conditions, for us. They miss holidays, anniversaries, birthdays, family weddings, and sometimes even a child's birth, for us. We are able to worship freely in this country because they have taken an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States, for us. As Christians, we owe them a debt of gratitude for the freedom to worship at Ascension. As Americans, we owe them a debt of gratitude for the ability to sleep soundly each night in our homes.

A TASTE OF THE DANIEL PLAN

When we first became aware of the Daniel Plan, we were somewhat familiar with the story of Daniel in the Bible. Nonetheless, we were curious why Rick Warren would name his lifestyle plan after him. We found out the Daniel Plan is a healthy lifestyle based on the Old Testament story of Daniel because he rejected the king's rich food in order to honor God's best for him and his friends. Daniel was a young Israelite carried into captivity when the Babylonians invaded Israel. The Babylonian king, Nebuchadnezzar, decided to train the best and the brightest of these captives so they could be placed in positions of authority within the government. King Nebuchadnezzar instituted a three-year training program, and while they were being trained, the young captives were to be fed the same food found on the royal table. But Daniel knew this wouldn't be a healthy diet, so he asked that he and three of his friends be allowed to eat healthier. At the end of ten days, they looked better and were more robust than those who ate the king's menu (Daniel 1:1-21).

Daniel's request was not about a diet plan; rather, he understood God wanted him to live a healthy lifestyle so he could serve God no matter where he was located. Healthy living requires faith as the foundation, trusting that God's way is the best way, while following his prescription for your health.

Personally, we have been on a decades long crusade to lead a healthy lifestyle. In the last several years, we have become more aware of the healing qualities found in certain foods. Our faith in God has become a more important component as we continue the journey. We ask you to consider studying the Daniel Plan with a group or by yourself. We are confident you will be amazed by the transforming power of this lifestyle.

AVOCADO & BEAN BURRITO

Ingredients

- •2 cups shredded romaine lettuce
- •2 tablespoons yellow onion, chopped
- •1/2 medium avocado, peeled, pitted, and chopped
- •2 tablespoons chopped cilantro
- •4 tablespoons chunky tomato salsa
- •1/2 cup nonfat, vegetarian refried beans
- •2 sprouted corn tortillas

Preparation:

Mix the lettuce, onion, avocado, cilantro, and salsa in a medium bowl until the vegetables are evenly coated. Smear half of the beans on each tortilla, fill with vegetable mixture, and wrap burrito style.

Donna learned about the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. Tribal government records show 38,000 enrolled members living on Pine Ridge Reservation. The poverty on Pine Ridge can be described in no other terms than Third World.

Redeemer United Church of Christ in Sussex is hosting a chicken dinner fundraiser on November 8. It includes half a chicken, parsley potatoes, beans, roll and butter, relishes, and beverage for \$10/adult and \$4/child. They are also collecting donations of winter items and gifts for a Christmas Party.
