

THE GREATEST STORY EVER TOLD

I am convinced that the work of God at Easter is far more difficult to believe than God's gift of a baby in a manger. Easter calls us to believe what we have not seen even once, while babies are born every day.

I said those words aloud during a time of reflection and prayer. I decided they were worth writing down. Maybe. Maybe not. Regardless of the ability of those words to inspire, the sentiment is no less true. A baby in a manger is easy...unless your name is Mary. Easter, however, presents a whole host of problems. Resurrection from sealed tombs and beating hearts stopped and started again without medical intervention are much harder for our logical and proof-demanding world to accept, let alone understand. Yet still I believe.



And yet, somehow, this story continues to be told again and again. Through the words of Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24, and John 20, the story of the resurrection of Jesus is told. Through the music of *Jesus Christ is Risen Today* and *I Know that My Redeemer Lives*, we hear the news of the resurrection. In the creeds of the universal Christian Church, we speak words of belief that have been spoken by generations of Christians from as early as 325 AD. If this story was simply a device to control people, or if this story was used to simply explain the great mysteries of the world at any time, then I would have expected the story of the resurrection of Jesus to just as simply fall away over these last 1,691 years since the first confession of faith was made at the Council of Nicea.

And certainly, as the story – told in hope and faith – has become too great a burden to bear, people have walked away. And yet, the story continues to be told. I am convinced of the truth of the story of the resurrection of the dead because I have witnessed the faith of far too many believers who have passed on the story to me. The resurrection of Jesus grounds me in this world and promises me a place in the next. I know there will be more days of fear than courage. I know I will suffer long days of doubt over belief. I know that there will be days ahead that will cause pain in this life. And yet, still I believe. As I said in my sermon a few weeks ago, the place between fear and doubt is the foundation of Easter and the power of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Still I believe, "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" They are words I heard as a child. They are words I speak over my children today. They are words of power – resurrection power. They are words that promise life. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

QUIET MIRACLES

What images spring to mind when you hear the word *miracle*? Perhaps you picture the feeding of the 5,000? In your mind's eye, you witness Jesus and the disciples in the midst of the miracle of multiplication. You marvel as they feed thousands of hungry people with five loaves and two fish. Or maybe your mind immediately rests at the grave of Lazarus. Standing next to the stone, weeping with Martha, you hear Jesus call Lazarus by name. You rejoice with Martha and the others and help peel away Lazarus' grave clothes. Or maybe the final days of the Easter season compel the miracle of all miracles to the forefront of your mind. You visualize yourself rushing with the women to anoint Jesus and you find the stone rolled away. You stand in the empty tomb amazed by angels. You run to tell the disciples the good news, "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Hallelujah!" Our sacred stories offer an abundance of miracles: Moses parting the Red Sea, Daniel in the lions' den, Jesus healing the ten lepers, Jesus walking on water, Jesus turning water into wine...and so many others.

Merriam-Webster defines miracle as: an unusual or wonderful event that is believed to be caused by the power of God. The miracles that are recorded in the Bible are awesome. They are astonishing and unmistakable. But the majority of miracles enter our lives quietly, gently, almost on tiptoe. These simple miracles unfold around us each day. They arrive without fanfare or accolades. In fact, they often blend into the background of our busy lives. But I contend that even these commonplace miracles are caused by the power of God.

Ascension's GriefShare ministry is an excellent example of the power of God reaching into our quotidian lives. GriefShare is a support group for people grieving the death of a family member or friend. Admittedly, at first glance, a support group may seem mundane but every week, a humble miracle emerges. As we gather in our collective lament, there is comfort. In our corporate heartbreak, we find strength. In our shared discontent, God reminds us that we are never alone. This is the everyday miracle of becoming the body of Christ together.

Joyce, a GriefShare participant, lost her husband Don last year. But she was only able to attend the very end of our fall GriefShare sessions. Fortunately, Joyce returned for the spring GriefShare cycle. Unfortunately, shortly after the spring session began, Joyce's mother Eleanor suffered a tragic stroke and died on February 2. In just seven months, Joyce lost her husband and mother. In situations like this, grief is compounded. As the family faced the funeral preparations, they encountered an unforeseen complication. Months earlier, Eleanor chose a lovely floral dress for her burial. Unfortunately, her short sleeved-dress exposed the bruises on her arms from her recent hospital stay. Joyce and her sister searched for something to cover their mother's arms – possibly a sweater or a nice jacket. But the dress' unique color was just too difficult to match. Thankfully, before abandoning the search, Joyce remembered the prayer shawl she received from Ascension's prayer shawl ministry. Immediately, she knew it was the right thing to do. She took the shawl to the funeral home and it was a perfect match. The prayer shawl had flecks of all of the colors of Eleanor's dress. They draped the prayer shawl over Eleanor's arms – a tender gift for her final journey.

God uses simple things like yarn, prayers, and willing hands to enter into our lives in ordinary ways that have extraordinary impact. However, if we're not careful, we might just miss the presence of these quiet miracles that silently surround us. It is my prayer that the next time we witness a stranger's kindness, an elder's wisdom, a mother's love, sharing peace, or the faith of a child, we ask ourselves, "Is this *caused by the power of God?*"

Martin Luther, in his explanation to the Apostles' Creed, details the relationship that our God has with us. Our Heavenly Father has made us and provides for us richly on a daily basis with all we need. He defends, guards, and protects us. He does this out of divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. Jesus has redeemed us with His precious, innocent blood through His suffering and death. The Holy Spirit sanctifies the Church and keeps it with Jesus Christ. God daily forgives all our sins and will raise us up on the last day to eternal life in Christ. God does all of that for us. What do we do in return?



Our response to this generous God is to be generous in all of our worship by sharing God's many blessings in our daily life. The American Heritage dictionary defines worship as the reverent love and allegiance accorded a deity...a set of ceremonies, prayers and other religious forms by which this love is expressed. In our liturgy we offer the prayer: We offer what You have first given us; ourselves, our time, and our possessions; signs of Your gracious love. It is God's gift to us, not our gifts to God. We are merely returning a portion of His gifts.

At the April meeting, the Council had a brainstorming session on how we as leaders can encourage all of us to reflect and act on these truths. The Council committed itself to improve its communication with the congregation regarding the financial needs it has to maintain in order to enhance God's work at Ascension. We also committed to perform a diligent and prudent review of the church's expenditures.

FORGET ME NOT: JUDY FRANKE

A visit in a rehab facility with Judy was quite insightful, as I learned bits and pieces about her life, similar to the large puzzle she was assembling on a card table in front of her. Judy has been a long-time Ascension member and was very active in many different areas of Ascension over the past 30 years.



Judy was born and raised in Sheboygan, WI. Her mom was a stay-at-home-mother and her father worked at Armeyr Leather Tanning Factory. She has one younger brother who lives in Prairie Du Chien.

After high school, Judy attended school at Prospect Hall Secretarial School and stayed at a Lutheran Girls Home in Milwaukee. Her first job was working at the Milwaukee YMCA. Other jobs through her years included Continental Can Company, an insurance agency, and MATC as the secretary to the Dean of Students.

In 1966, she married her husband, Richard. He worked in bindery at Arandell Corporation Printing, in Menomonee Falls. They had two daughters. Kay is their oldest and lives in Sheboygan and teaches 2nd grade. Kay is married to Jim and they have two children, a sophomore and a junior in high school. Judy's youngest daughter Jody, who is a special education aide at Menomonee Falls High School, lives in Pewaukee and is married to Scott. They have one child CJ, who is a freshman communications major at Edgewood College, in Madison.

Judy moved to Waukesha in 1968. Her husband still worked in Menomonee Falls and she had a part-time job as the secretary for probation and parole at the Waukesha County Courthouse. Judy and Richard joined Ascension in 1973 for Jody's baptism. Judy became active in church activities and was the AAL secretary (currently Thrivent) for Ascension. She also planned monthly activities, including big chili suppers. Judy would pop some popcorn and pick up McDonald's "orange drink" and bring them to the Ascension baseball games for the secretaries. Another big activity she planned was the church auction. People would donate gifts and the money was all given to the church. Some of the gifts included services like getting a baked pie every month, or getting a rental at a cottage on a lake up north. People were very generous with their gifts and the auctions were always big events at Ascension. Judy also worked as a secretary in Ascension's office; kept the kitchen clean; and did all of the funeral planning in the church.

In the past year, Judy has kept active by setting up motorcoach tours, working at voting polls, and teaching crochet classes for the Waukesha Parks and Rec. Department and learning in retirement (LIR) at WCTC. She also enjoys a group in which she is able to play sheepshead and bridge. Judy is also in two Red Hat groups.

Judy has received so much joy from being a mentor for Eh th'Blay Paw and Paw Pa Soe. She has made it possible for the girls to become involved in 4H and the girls have taken classes on quilting, basketry, swimming, and soccer. These girls are very important in Judy's life.

Health concerns with hospitalizations have limited several activities in Judy's life since August 2015, but Judy looks forward to returning to activities she enjoys when she is feeling better.

A TASTE OF THE DANIEL PLAN: GLUTEN PART 2

Last month we began discussing the huge subject of gluten. We explained the difference between someone that is gluten intolerant versus someone who is gluten sensitive. This month, we continue unpacking the topic of gluten sensitivity. As a reminder, gluten sensitivity is not a genetically-based autoimmune disease like Celiac disease but has many of the same symptoms. You may recall the co-author of The Daniel Plan Dr. Mark Hyman states that 99 percent of people who have a sensitivity to gluten do not even know it.


Since we both have a gluten sensitivity, we are obviously more aware of the problems associated with ingesting gluten. We often hear of people that know or suspect they have a sensitivity or even an intolerance to gluten, but chose to ignore it because it is "too much trouble" or "too expensive" to do anything about it.

It is important for people to understand the ramifications of ignoring the problem. It is not just having the discomfort of bloating, heartburn, or constipation. The reality is that continued exposure to gluten to someone that is sensitive or intolerant can cause irreparable damage to their gut. When we use the term "gut," we are not just referring to the slang term people give to the stomach. In addition to your stomach, the gut refers to your intestines, colon, pancreas and liver. Your gut is responsible for 70 percent of your immunity. It is also where 90 percent of the neurotransmitters (chemicals responsible for

Steve and Carol Spieker, The Daniel Plan Leaders regulating mood) are produced. Therefore, it is an extremely important part of our body and must be protected.

Gluten in the gut of a sensitive body constantly inflames the GI tract. It is like having a scrape on your arm and constantly rubbing it against a rough surface over and over. It never gets better and probably will get worse. In addition to the inflammation, the intestines become damaged. The inside of your intestines are lined with fibers like old fashioned shag carpet. Those fibers are designed to snag the nutrients of the food youingest so it can be absorbed and distributed throughout your body for fuel. Constant inflammation in the intestines causes those fibers to get matted down. When they are matted down, they are not able to snag the nutrients. Consequently, the gluten sensitive person ingests the calories and most of the nutrition just flows right through the GI tract and literally goes right down the toilet, essentially causing malnourishment.

The Daniel Plan suggests all people do a 10–40 day detox of gluten. During that period, a person should not ingest ANY gluten, which will allow their gut to heal. After that period of time, that person can reintroduce gluten and see how it affects them. In our experience, it likely will take far more than 40 days to heal one's gut. Because of the other negative effects of ingesting glutinous foods, it is best to permanently eliminate them.



BAKED FRUIT

- Fresh fruit in season, 4 cups
- Balsamic vinegar, 1 tablespoon
- ½ teaspoon ground allspice or cardamom

Preparation:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees
- 2. Cut fresh fruit into 1-2" cubes and place in a shallow baking dish.
- 3. Drizzle with balsamic vinegar.
- 4. Sprinkle fruit with dried allspice and cardamom.
- 5. Bake for 15 minutes or until fruit is tender.
