



At the July council meeting, we were again blessed to have a respectful exchange of ideas about what is best for God's little flock here at Ascension. In a world where we experience polarization and an unwillingness to listen and understand ideas other than our own, this experience is encouraging and bodes well for our future.

The council reviewed Mike Jahner's factfinding report about continuing lawn maintenance through a vendor or doing it with a group of church members. The decision was made to continue with an outside service Du? Paul Wehmeier, Council President because it is more cost effective long term. We thank Mike for his expertise on this.

Jeremy Poling reported on his initial findings regarding utility use. These findings indicate that, with additional work, the congregation should be able to achieve a goal of reducing utility expenditures by \$1000 per year.

In the middle of tragedy, God brings out the best is us. Ascension, as God's family, once again gave evidence of this. Many people in the community witnessed this at Fabricio Aparicio's death and funeral. This was again observed at the healing/grieving session on July 10. This was attended by family members, students who participated in the JOLT trip, their parents, staff, and chaperones. We thank Pastor Angela for organizing this. We will continue to watch over our teenagers who experienced this tragic event and the family who suffered such a great loss.



RESULTS ARE IN: COMMUNICATIONS SURVEY 2016

Thank you to everyone who participated in our recent communications survey. With 73 responses, about 10% of adults in the congregation participated. Almost all were members and many attend weekly and participate in Bible study or other church programs. The majority of respondents were between the ages of 65-74. The survey was available online and in paper and about half of the responses were from paper forms.



- 73% were satisfied with communications from Ascension
- 21% were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied
- 7% were somewhat dissatisfied or dissatisfied

The most-used forms of communications were (in descending order): pastors' announcements, bulletin announcements, the e-alert, and the online newsletter. Interestingly, respondents were equally split and diametrically opposed on the mailed newsletter: 48% always read it and 48% never read it.

In the newsletter, the most read articles/information were (in order): pastors' articles, event briefs, thank you letters, council news, finances, membership, care ministries, the calendar, mission outreach and small groups. Ninety-three percent said they were looking for event information; 83% articles about Ascension (council, finances, membership, etc.), 66% Care Ministries, 64% faith articles, 62% Spiritual Growth articles, 58% worship articles, and 49% Mission Outreach articles.

Some helpful information was gained regarding the e-alert. More than one person asked for shorter notices in the e-alert for better readability. Consequently, we've made minor changes to shorten information in the e-alert. If necessary, more information is available with the click of a button that takes people to our website.

On the non-communications questions: 53% of respondents have taken advantage of Children's Ministries or Adult Education between services and 66% would not be interested in a kiosk in the lobby for donations or registration fees.


For the month of June, actual contributions were slightly below budget. Actual total income for the month was below budget.

Why doesn't He intervene?"

We know that God is all powerful, all knowing, ever present, but do we take time to connect with our God in prayer for wisdom, guidance, and deliverance?

Most of us feel weak and powerless to change what we see. The Bible tells us in Jeremiah 29:13, "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart."

CARE MINISTRIES: OUTDOOR MEAL SAFETY

Do you enjoy having meals outdoors with family and friends? What do you need to know to not get sick? You're more likely to get sick on a picnic when the weather is warm. The CDC, and other experts on foodborne illness, suggest taking special precautions on picnics, particularly if you're pregnant or feeding kids, the elderly, or someone with a chronic illness like diabetes.

The #1 easy rule: Many food-poisoning cases year-round are caused by bacteria, which grow faster at warm temperatures. So the basic protocol to follow is "hot foods should be kept hot and cold foods should be kept cold to prevent rapid bacterial growth," says Donald Zink, PhD, senior science adviser at the FDA's Center for Food Safety and Applied Nutrition.

Brenda Lytle, RN, Director of Care Ministries

Experts call the window between 40°F and 140°F "the danger zone," because it's between those temps that bacteria grow rapidly, and lots of multiplying bacteria means an increased risk of getting sick. Keep perishable food from drifting into the danger zone by refrigerating it or keeping it on ice (at 40°F or below) or heating it (to 140°F or above). This is especially important when it's hot outside. "Bacteria grows rapidly at room temperature, but it grows even faster when the weather is between 90°F and 110°F," says Elisabeth Hagen, MD, USDA undersecretary for food safety. That's why the USDA recommends that you never leave food un-chilled for more than two hours (one hour if you're in 90° heat or hotter).

CARE MINISTRY EVENTS: CLASSES & BLOOD DRIVE BABYSITTING TRAINING

Classes are offered in August for teens and pre-teens, ages 11 years-old and older to become certified in babysitting. The classes are August 15 or 17. One full-day class is required to become certified. Class runs from 8:30 a.m-3 p.m., in Ascension's East or West Halls. The cost is \$35, which includes lunch, Red Cross certification, and all course materials. Class size is limited to 10 students each day, so sign up now on the Care Ministry bulletin board or email Brenda Lytle at brenda@ascensionelca.org.



FORGET ME NOT: ELMER SEDIVY

So much has changed since Elmer and Elaine Sedivy moved to Waukesha in 1954 from Park Falls, living in temporary housing on St. Paul Avenue across from Waukesha Motor Works. In that same housing group was Pastor Egloff, Ascension's first pastor.

Elmer and Elaine became charter members of Ascension Lutheran Church, which began as a small faith community on the corner of Fairview and Madison streets. Pastor Egloff was a part-time pastor also working at Hopson Oil Company. Among the families in the new church were the Reicherts, Ullspergers, and Warrens (Elaine's parents). Elmer served on the church board and was a member of the men's club in these early years.

Elmer was born in Nebraska 95 years ago on August 23 to a farming family. In 1934, during the Depression, the family moved to Park Falls, WI. Elmer and Elaine met at a carnival in Park Falls while in high school. The couple waited until April 1945 to marry (at Trinity Lutheran Church in Park Falls), after Elmer returned from military service at the end of WWII. He was stationed in Oregon waiting for deployment to the Pacific Theater when the war ended and he returned to Wisconsin to work as a mechanic.

After moving to Waukesha in 1954, Elmer worked at a foundry for two years, a Brookfield construction company for 17 years, and Wisconsin Centrifugal for 18 years where he retired in 1986. He worked on road and bridge construction and as a machine

repairman. His hobbies made use of his mechanical skills restoring old cars. He could fix most any mechanical part of the several cars he owned. He sold his 1951 green Kaiser sedan in 2009.

Elmer and Elaine had two children, a son Lenard and daughter Susan. Lenard and his wife Connie live in Waukesha and are Ascension members. Susan and husband Craig live in Park Falls. They have three children, all girls, Samantha, Cassandra and Ann (Andy).

Elmer lives in an apartment at Berkshire at Kensington where he spends his time playing dart ball, strolling the grounds, and playing bingo. He learned his cooking skills in the army cooking for 100 men and still cooks for himself with support from the meals-on-wheels program. Elmer says he's "not too much for desserts and stays away from the sweet stuff."

Faith life is important to Elmer. He attends worship services at Berkshire and at Ascension usually at the 8:30/9 a.m. service with Lenard when able. Two religious decorations in his apartment speak of his faith connections as he welcomes monthly visits from pastoral assistants to share communion and personal stories. He feels blessed to be in good shape mentally and physically.


Ascension members are invited to remember Elmer during August with prayers, birthday greetings, and cards as he celebrates his 95th birthday. Happy birthday, Elmer!

In sister parish relationships, we support each other in all things. In this spirit, we have heard from Pastor Lema that our sister parishes in Mount Meru are lifting Ascension up in prayer at the death of Fabricio Aparicio during the middle school Adventure Camp.

While we were there, we continued to hear heart-breaking stories of the gang violence that caused Fabricio's family to flee.


The agroferreteria (hardware store) continues to thrive. They recently purchased a large truck, and on July 10, they opened their third branch. Plans are already in place for a fourth store in San Jorge that will provide employment to our sister parish. The project continues to meet both of their goals: providing funding for local churches and providing employment for men and young boys, keeping them safe from the reaches of the gangs and allowing them to provide for their families.

The church at San Jorge is doing well. Their guitar lesson program is growing and many children are involved in providing the music at church every Sunday. They are working to collect the funds for a toilet at church, a \$2000 project. Each family contributes an additional offering of \$2 every month, and they are planning raffles. In the long term, their goal is to purchase a fence to protect the church grounds. In addition to their congregational efforts to raise these funds, the agroferreteria and Ascension will be assisting.

We are in the process of planning to welcome a delegation from El Salvador to Ascension in the next year, as well as looking at plans for a mission trip from Ascension to El Salvador during either spring break or summer of 2017. A TASTE OF THE DANIEL PLAN

Recently, we had the opportunity to meet with some business clients. At past meetings, we have discussed their desire to live a healthier lifestyle. In fact, two years ago, we sent them a favorite book of ours on the topic as a thank you gift for all their business over the years. On this most recent visit, after exchanging some pleasantries, the wife said, "We just have to thank you for giving us our son back!" A bit puzzled we asked, "How?" They explained because of our discussions with them over the years on cleaning up their diet, they discovered their son was allergic to sugar and brewer's yeast. These allergies were responsible for causing him to be significantly AD/HD to the point that he had to be medicated with anti-psychotic medications, which significantly changed his personality. As a result, he has changed his diet and is no longer taking those medications.



This experience reminded us about how many adults are encountering food allergies. We have already discussed gluten issues extensively in previous articles. Other common food allergies include dairy products, eggs, soy, nuts, alcohol, nightshades (tomatoes, peppers and eggplant) as well as sugar, as noted before.

Adult onset allergies are becoming more prolific due in large part to the increase in "leaky gut." Leaky gut occurs when your digestive system develops tears in the lining that allow bad bacteria, toxins, and undigested food to leak into your bloodstream. This, in turn, causes your immune system to go into overdrive essentially keeping it in the "on" position. Consequently, your immune system essentially attacks everything in its path which triggers food allergies. At the risk of sounding like a broken record, leaky gut is often the result of ingesting processed and genetically modified foods that are rampant in the standard American diet.

The Daniel Plan encourages a 40 day detox as part of the study. During that time, it is suggested you will let go of all stimulants and sedatives (alcohol, coffee, etc.), processed and fast food, all artificial sweeteners, all forms of sugar, all dairy products and all gluten. During that time, you could also eliminate other suspected allergens such as nuts or eggs. At the conclusion of the 40 days, you can begin to reintroduce these various items one at a time. If you find you have a negative reaction, you may have an indication you have an allergy and you may want to consult a medical professional for further diagnosis. You likely will feel so much better abstaining from these foods; you will have no desire to go back to them anyway.

Contrary to common beliefs, what you put in your bodies DOES have an effect. Just because everyone around you is running through the drive through or downing a bag of Doritos while watching the game doesn't make it a good idea. Recently we heard someone say, "One bad meal won't kill you but a thousand will!"
