#### **Autumn Rituals**

ear People of God,
Already the winds of autumn have brought us to the gates of November.
How quickly the days of summer have given way to falling leaves and crisp morning breezes. **November 6** will gather us to the celebration of All Saints Sunday. We will once again read the names of those connected to our community who died during the past year and light candles in remembrance of all who have gone before us and now rest from their labors. We live within the communion of saints. We trust the promise of God that the power of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ holds true for each of us - as it has for the generations that have come before us and as it will for the countless generations that will come after us. Often times in our world, we find the power of God's promises overshadowed by the darkness of the cross in our lives. Where Easter joy should reign over us, we find ourselves overwhelmed with pain, death, and grief. All Saints Day gathers us with the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth.

In Celtic Christian spirituality, the place where heaven and earth meet—the moments where God enters into our world—are called "thin places." This is an idea that suggests a thinning of the veil between life and death, between human and divine, between ordinary and miraculous. For most of us, these places are what we crave for in our lives of faith. "Give me a sign, Lord." Ever heard yourself speaking those words? I have. Usually in the most despairing moments—the moments when no answer seems best—is when I hear myself telling God to get on with it. Tell me which way so I can move on, step up, go forward, put something behind me. Once in awhile, I really feel that God nudges in one direction or another. Most of the time, I pray and I hope and I cross my fingers—not the sign of the cross mind you, just that hopeful kind of lucky wish and jump. Sometimes God blesses and other times God somehow puts me back at the beginning and lets me start over. The path is not always easy but I hold on to hope and I trust that God is there in the midst.

**November 13** will call us to gather for the annual meeting of the congregation. In our church governance, it is the congregation that approves a yearly budget, elects new church council members, and approves a slate of candidates to attend our regional assembly of congregations next June. The meeting will begin at noon and will be a potluck. We invite you to join us to hear about Ascension and the mission and ministry of the congregation as well the continued work on Ascension Arise, our 2025 Vision. On

**November 6**, in-between services at 9:45, you will have the opportunity to review the 2017 budget and ask questions in a smaller setting before the annual meeting the following week. #### Forget Me Not: Ed Haker

d Haker enjoys good conversation and loves his family and God. He finds joy in serving others, and, these days, he says it's about the small things you can do for someone like hold the door open, smile, and just be friendly!

Ed grew up in Milwaukee around 46th and Hadley. When he was 10-years-old, he had rheumatic fever and spent six months in bed. During that time, his parents bought him a book about boats and thus began Eddie's love for boats. At about age 10½, Eddie designed and built his first boat; it had a wood frame and was covered in muslin. He made it water tight by covering it with salt water and then he painted it. It even had an outboard motor! Over the years, Eddie designed and built 50-100 boats for many people. He remembers fondly building one in Nancy's Grandpa Jung's basement and one in his aunt's extra bedroom. Eddie also took part in a boat race on Lake Winnebago. It started in Neenah; the halfway point was in Fremont on the Wolf River; and then back for a total of 92 miles. The boat was 10 feet long and went 35 miles per hour. Eddie drove that boat on his knees, and during the race, he had a steering problem, but he was able to repair it and finish. He proudly displays a picture Nancy took at the end of the race. Eddie said that part of his life went very quickly!

Eddie was 16 when he started delivering ice cream for Luick Seal Test around Milwaukee. It was during WWII and one day, his employer came to Eddie and needed him to drive the semi delivering ice cream to Green Bay, Madison, and the Great Lakes Naval Base. So at 16, Eddie became a semi-truck driver.

Eddie graduated from Washington High School in Milwaukee and went on to graduate from Marquette. Eddie's cousin Joan set him up on a blind date with a girl she worked with and so began his life with Nancy. They were married on April 11, 1953.

Eddie had different jobs but in the early 1950's his uncle offered him a job building homes. It didn't take Eddie long to know that designing homes and helping people get the home they wanted was his passion. He designed and built homes for his family and made a career of designing and building homes for others. When he wasn't doing that, he was working as a mechanical engineer consultant. He enjoyed working with people one-on-one.

Ed and Nancy were blessed with three daughters: Vicki, Karen, and Lori. When Lori was ten and a half, she became very sick with the chicken pox, and on April 1, 1971, Lori died.

Nancy and Ed turned their grief into the Lori Jean Haker Memorial Fund, which continues to support professorships for infectious disease research through Children's Hospital to this day.

Ed and Nancy were long time members of Sherman Park

Lutheran Church, where Ed held all of the church offices and served on various committees. One of his favorites was supervising the addition at the church.

Here at Ascension, Ed is a member of the Monday night AMEN Ministry group and filled the altar candles for many years. He said he enjoyed the quiet of the sanctuary as he filled the candles. Over the years, you may have seen Ed and Nancy in the summer months caring for the outdoor plants as they watered and pulled weeds.

Over the past few years, Ed has written his life story, about 12-13 chapters, for his family to enjoy one day. What a gift he has given to his family! These days, Ed and Nancy enjoy their six grandchildren and six great grandchildren. "I see how the Lord has taken me by the hand and guided me all these years," Ed states, showing his faith and trust - a lesson we can all learn from.

### **Line Dancing Success**

Twenty-five people kicked up their heels for some fun aerobic dancing on Monday nights this fall. The music was current and upbeat, and the routines were well-instructed. Thanks to Ascension's own Linda Elder for her time, choreography, and instruction. Watch for classes this spring.

I am so thankful to the wonderful ladies who joined me during the 5-week session of the *Life Line Exercise Class* in which we exercised through line dancing and low to midlevel aerobics. We began each session with a Scripture reading regarding dance. We praised God through dance to several contemporary Christian songs, each having a special message. #### A Taste of The Daniel Plan

xcuse us for repeating ourselves but this is worth repeating! We <u>all</u> have cancer! Knowing this is one of the reasons we are so passionate about teaching people about living a healthy lifestyle. Very few people realize they have cancer cells floating around in their bodies. Like most, they imagine they "catch" cancer much like you catch a cold or perhaps it's in their genes and it is just a matter of time until they get the dreaded diagnosis.

In the same way, very few people realize there is much they can do to prevent cancer. The reality is God made our bodies to be well-oiled machines. Quite simply - our bodies are amazing! When God created us, He equipped us with a high tech immune system capable of battling injuries, infections, even cancer to restore our health. The problem is our modern lifestyle has overwhelmed our immune systems. The situation is much like a Volkswagen trying to pull a fully loaded semi-trailer uphill; it simply was not designed to do that. Most people are throwing so much toxic waste at their immune system in the form of processed foods, toxic chemicals, and other things, the body simply can't do what it is designed to do, which is fight disease.

We lost a friend to cancer this summer. We were just informed of another friend diagnosed with cancer that is living out his final days, and tomorrow, we will be attending the funeral of someone that died solely because of his lifestyle. All of these folks were "our age." We think that is unacceptable and is why we encourage you to look into The Daniel Plan. The study is a blueprint of God's plan for you to live out a healthy and purposeful life of service to Him.

## Special Friends

In October, Special Friends attended the Trick or Treat Spooktacular at the Milwaukee County Zoo. This annual event is always fun, and the zoo goes above and beyond in making everyone feel welcomed!

The acronym PURE from the Pure Ministries (special needs ministry in Georgia) is a fabulous description of all our special friends. PURE stands for: (P)erfectly created by a loving sovereign God, designed for His purposes; (U)nique in his or her own gifts, blessings, talents, desires, and contributions;

(R)eceptive and responsive to our communication, touch, and acts of love;

(E)ternal: there are no disabled souls.

This month, I will discuss Down syndrome. According to the National Down

Syndrome Society, one in every 691 babies in the U.S. is born with Down syndrome, making Down syndrome the most common genetic condition. Approximately 400,000 Americans have Down syndrome and about 6,000 babies with Down syndrome are born each year. All people with Down syndrome have feelings, thoughts, interests, and know what they want from life. Most people, with support, lead interesting, independent, and fulfilling adult lives.

NIGHT.

Down syndrome occurs when an individual has a full or partial, extra copy of chromosome 21. This additional genetic material alters the course of development and causes the characteristics associated with Down syndrome. A few of the common physical traits of Down syndrome are low muscle tone, small stature, an upward slant to the eyes, and a single deep crease across the center of the palm. Although, it is important to remember that each person with Down syndrome is a unique individual and may possess these characteristics to different degrees or not at all.

#### **Down Syndrome facts**

- \* Life expectancy for people with Down syndrome has increased dramatically in recent decades from 25 in 1983 to 60 today.
- \* The incidence of births of children with Down syndrome increases with the age of the mother; however; due to higher fertility rates in younger women, 80% of children with Down syndrome are born to women under 35 years of age.
- \* People with Down syndrome attend school, work, participate in decisions that affect them, have meaningful relationships, vote, and contribute to society in many wonderful ways.
- \* All people with Down syndrome experience cognitive delays, but the effect is usually mild to moderate and is not indicative of the many strengths and talents that each individual possesses.
- \* Quality educational programs, a stimulating home environment, good health care, and positive support from family, friends, and the community enable people with Down syndrome to lead fulfilling and productive lives.

"Many people reduce people with disabilities and diseases to their diagnosis without seeing the fullness of their common humanity," according to Amy Julia Becker in *Christianity Today*. God does not, however, for 1 Samuel 16:7 says, "The Lord does not look at the things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." May we all be blessed to see each other as God sees us.





Events will be run two weeks prior to the event, unless there is something related to the event that will take place sooner, i.e. event registration. If that is the case, please re-write and re-submit periodically to keep things interesting. E-alert announcements

## **Habitat for Humanity**

veryone deserves a decent place to live. People in our community and all over the world partner with Habitat for Humanity to build or improve a place they can call home. Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and pay an affordable mortgage. With our help, Habitat homeowners achieve the strength, stability, and independence they need to build a better life for themselves and their families.

In June of this year, Milwaukee Habitat welcomed its 1,000<sup>th</sup> family served in the Greater Milwaukee area into their new home. Over the past 32 years, Milwaukee Habitat has carried out their vision of building a world where everyone has a decent place to live through new construction, home rehab, and repair programs. For the last four years, Milwaukee Habitat has focused all of their work in the Washington Park neighborhood as part of a five-year neighborhood revitalization strategy. ## YOUR COUNCIL AT WORK

#### Council News

Ascension's by-laws state, "the Congregation Council shall Budget Team members are the Treasurer, Council be responsible for the financial and property matters of this congregation."

This is most visible as the council, staff, and wing leaders collaborate in the budget process. The process begins in late summer when the council sets a specific dollar amount for the annual budget. We arrive at this number by looking at giving over the past several years and then setting what we view as a realistic amount of contributions for the coming year. (Unfortunately, there has been no growth in this number in recent years. When you receive stewardship material in the near future, I would ask that your household engage in earnest prayer and reflection on God's will for your role in supporting the church in your giving and in your service).

After this number has been set, the Director of Ministries, Director of Operations, and staff meet with their areas of ministry and with a Financial Development Team member. The Budget Team meets to arrive at a balanced budget proposal. This can involve a number of meetings. The

President, 1st Vice President, Director of Ministries, Director of Operations, and the pastors.

This proposal is then brought to the church council. The church council then reviews this line by line, asking questions and engaging in discussion. All of this is aimed at achieving a plan to carry out God's work through His flock at Ascension. This work was completed last night at a late hour.

There will be a question and answer opportunity in early November. Please avail yourself of this opportunity to be informed. Ascension's Annual Meeting is Nov. 13 at noon, beginning with a potluck lunch. The budget will be presented and voted on at this time. In addition to the budget, we will be electing church officers and representatives to Synod Assembly and addressing congregational reports and decisions. Please plan to be a part of this important meeting in the life of Ascension.
