For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works.

Romans 3:23-24, 26b-28

Reformation Celebration

October marks the time in our church calendar when we commemorate the Reformation and this year is the 500th anniversary! This month, we are especially mindful of the great reformer, Martin Luther. People from all over the world will travel to Germany for the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. This pilgrimage to Germany will be an inspirational, once-in-a-lifetime journey as people from various faith backgrounds trace the footsteps of our denomination's founder, Martin Luther. Doubtless, these pilgrims will enjoy a time of spiritual renewal by exploring the roots of Protestantism and reflecting upon centuries of religious history.

Luther is, arguably, one of the most influential people of all time. Certainly you are familiar with the Reformation story. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, who was a Roman Catholic priest and theology professor, nailed the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. His main call to reform was in the area of indulgences. In the medieval church, believers were told they could buy their way into heaven -quite literally. For example, if you had a relative who died and you weren't too sure if they were in heaven or stuck in purgatory- well, just give more in the offering and your loved one's soul would fly right up to heaven. It is rumored that Johann Tetzel, a German Roman Catholic friar, was fond of saying, "As soon as a coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs."

In contrast, Martin Luther argued that St. Paul teaches us otherwise. Through Paul's words, we learn that we are all sinners. God, who is rich in mercy, offers forgiveness to us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We cannot purchase it. We didn't earn it and we don't deserve it! In fact, God even initiated the little faith that we do have. God, through Jesus, did it all. So, Paul's words serve to remind us that our works will never justify us. That is why St. Paul's letter to the Romans is foundational to Lutheran theology. According to Luther, "This letter is truly the most important piece in the New Testament. It is purest Gospel. It is well worth a Christian's while not only to memorize it word for word but also to occupy himself with it daily, as though it were the daily bread of the soul." Luther encourages us, "Faith is a work of God in us, which changes us and brings us to birth anew from God. It makes us completely different people in heart, mind, senses, and all our powers, and brings the Holy Spirit with it. What a living, creative, active powerful thing is faith! It is impossible that faith ever stops doing good. Faith doesn't ask whether good works are to be done, but, before it is asked, it has done them. It is always active. Faith is a living, unshakeable confidence in God's grace; it is so certain, that someone would die a thousand times for it. This kind of trust in and knowledge of God's grace makes a person joyful, confident, and happy with regard to God and all creatures. It is as impossible to separate works from faith as burning and shining from fire."

Praise God! We are Reformation people. It is part of our spiritual DNA. As Reformation people, we rely on God's everlasting promise of extravagant grace. Trusting in God's mercy, we endeavor to embrace our reformation heritage, remembering that we have been justified by the God who reshapes, reforms, and renews!

Okay, now what?


It takes four wings to fly. On October 22, we complete the image of the butterfly as we discover the *Caring* **Relationships** wing. Join us as we walk with each other



The Daniel Plan: Carbs

To carb or not to carb...that is the question! Low carb, high carb, no carbs, which carbs....what is a person supposed to eat? It seems like the world is full of all kinds of suggestions on what to eat and what not to eat...and then we come along with yet another one....so here goes.

Quite simply, not all carbs are bad. Unfortunately, too many people throw all carbs into one cart and label them "bad." Often times, when people decide to keep SOME carbs, they unfortunately choose the bad ones. The reality is that carbs are the "gas" in your car. They are what give our bodies the fuel to go through life with sufficient



energy. Just like a car, if you fill it with bad gas, it will cough and sputter and act sluggishly. When you fill it with good gas, your car runs smoothly and efficiently.

Carbs are actually grouped into two types: Simple carbs which are things like breads, pastas, white rice, fruit juices etc. Complex carbs include foods such as spinach, cauliflower, broccoli, kale, lentils and quinoa, just to name a few. We like to explain the two types of carbs using the analogy of a charcoal grill. Simple carbs act like when you spray charcoal lighter on your charcoal. When the match hits it, it flares up and quickly burns out. A complex carb is like the remaining burning embers that remain, slowly and continually smoldering providing energy to cook the food. When people eat simple carbs, they will often feel satisfied for a short period and then will feel a "crash" as it is often described. Complex carbs offer you extended periods of consistent energy and will help you avoid the "crash."

The "Daniel Plan Plate," as it is referred to in the Daniel Plan study, actually consists of 50% non-starchy vegetables (complex carbs), 25% healthy animal or vegetable protein and 25% healthy starch (simple carbs.) In addition, you may also have a low glycemic fruit and a beverage of water or herbal tea.

Good nutrition is not as big of a mystery as many people make it out to be. It is up to each person to learn about healthy foods so they can make their own good choices rather than being misled by skillful marketers at the ad agencies.

We spend a good amount of time talking about food in each Daniel Plan study. In addition to the topics in the Daniel Plan book, we teach group members some tips on reading labels, sample healthy foods, share recipes and even take a field trip to a grocery store to learn how to shop. Scholarship Support for Tanzania

Back to school time in Tanzania can be stressful and difficult. Even in the public schools, families have financial obligations that must be met in order for students to be allowed to attend school. Our sister parishes are located in rural communities with few opportunities for employment, so although the school fees are small by our standards, they can be impossibly steep for most families. Pastor Lema has asked for St. Luke's and Ascension to help the students of our sister parishes to be able to attend school. This is the one most important way for the next generation to have an improved life beyond what has limited so many in previous generations.



Last year, we set a goal to raise enough money to send 50 students to school in our partnership parish in Tanzania. At the end of the project, we raised enough money to send 89 students to school! That means we raised funds for maize and beans to cover tuition, books, and uniforms for the students. What a show of generosity! We don't want to turn our backs on these students. We will again raise funds to send students to school in our partner parish in Tanzania.

What are the per pupil costs? Each student must provide one large bag of corn and one small bag of beans (\$42), a school uniform (\$7), and books (\$11). The total cost for a year of school per student is \$60. The coffee farmers who participate in our coffee program are able to cover these costs. For the rest of the families, this cost is out of reach. In preparation for our delegation visit to Tanzania next summer, we will again be accepting offerings in all sizes; notate "Meru School" in the memo line of checks.

The Tanzanian Lutheran church is one of the largest Lutheran churches in the world. Mwitula Williams, [a third-generation Tanzanian Lutheran] thinks the rapid growth has everything to do with the church's commitment to social services. "At the end of the day, you can preach all you want, but what connects the community are basic needs," she said. "If my health is not good, my kids are not going to school. If I'm farming and don't have clean water, I'm not coming to church on Sunday. Before he taught people, Jesus made sure people's needs were met. Because the Lutheran church tries to live out the Gospel this way, that's why it's growing" (Living Lutheran magazine). Let's see how many students we can send to school in Meru this fall! Much has changed for our missionary family in Tanzania. When they were here two years ago, they were ready to send their daughter Megan off to Finland for graduate school and their son Nathan to the US to major in computers. Their performance as a family at Ascension that night was one of their last traditional family performances. Since then, Carol has spent months in cancer treatment here in Wisconsin. Randy and Marissa have traveled back and forth to Tanzania. Randy is primarily at the university at Makumira. They continue to need our prayers and support. Following are some quotes from his recent newsletter:

Grace and peace to you from the Stubbs family. You already know that this past year has been full of the highest highs and the lowest lows for us. We give thanks that we serve an awesome God who accompanies us in very real ways as we sojourn here on earth. The prayers of literally thousands of people all around the world have sustained us during this time. Thanks be to God!

We give thanks that Carol and I were able to make a trip to Tanzania together recently for one week. It was important for Carol to greet and also receive the numerous affirmations of her vital ministry in Tanzania from current and former students, colleagues, and friends. We may not see them this year due to our extenuating circumstances. Carol returns to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee on 6 September for the next round of chemotherapy plus a stem cell transplant from her brother. This is the best option for longer remission and Carol has passed all of the pre-testing and is stronger now than since last November. Marissa and I will remain with her until the end of October, and that gives us a chance to do some home assignment visits.

Other updates: Megan (23) has finished the educational component of her Masters final project in Tanzania and returns to Finland next week for her final semester. Marissa (22) is with us in the States and continues to progress on piano, harp, recorder, and now guitar. She is a big help for me and Carol. Nathan is back in Austin, TX as a Computer Science major and also continues to work part-time for People Patterns.

I (Randy) have been living a double life as primary caregiver for Carol and head of various activities at Tumaini University Makumira in Tanzania. I plan to make one more trip this year. In August, I made a "quick" trip to the Philippines and Malaysia to work on collaborative activities with Makumira. Finally, one Sunday, we were brought by my parents who had recently moved to Waukesha to Ascension, to a rather plain church in a corner of town that took


I encourage you to speak to Pastor Chris or Pastor Angela about any questions you have.


