#### Journey to Hallelujah

e are on a journey.

It seems that we are always on a journey of some sort. We travel on various Lenten journeys throughout our lives. The journey from Lent to Easter unfolds in our lives in various ways. For example, we journey from: illness to healing, job loss to security, addiction to wholeness, mourning to joy, or divorce to understanding. Life is complicated and often these journeys overlap. We may find ourselves confused or frustrated. Many of us might easily discover that we are on more than one journey at a time. Consequently, we may be forced to hold disparate experiences in tension. For some of us, it is not uncommon to navigate life's terrain with one foot in Easter and the other foot in Good Friday. We simultaneously survive while immersed in hope and disappointment. For example, a dear friend of mine was overjoyed about her recent dream-job-promotion, yet simultaneously devastated about her pending divorce. Luther proclaims, "We are always rising and we are always dying."

As Church, we experience this dichotomy no clearer than in Lent and Easter. As we near the end of our Lenten journey, we look forward to Easter with great anticipation, but first, we will endure the passion of Good Friday before we can embrace the glory of Easter morning. Yet, we can be encouraged because even though every step of our Lenten journey brings us closer to the cross, the cross is not our final destination. Thankfully, when we move closer to the crucifixion, we find ourselves closer to Easter. After all, there is no Easter without Good Friday, and there is no resurrection without death. Good Friday and Easter are tied together and, by extension, they are tied together within us because we are Resurrection people.

Like the narratives of Holy Week and Easter, each of our journeys tells a story. Our many and varied stories connect us to the broader Divine narrative. Thereby connecting us to every other child of God. So as we

journey toward Easter, we do not walk alone. We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. We make our way to Easter in the footsteps of faithful saints who have gone before us and lived out the love of Christ. As Resurrection people, every journey that we embark upon - by definition- leans toward Easter. As Resurrection people, we know that what seems like the end, is often the beginning. As Resurrection people, we believe that death gives way to new life. As Resurrection people, we know that the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it. Regardless of how desolate the terrain, regardless of how difficult the journey, we are Resurrection people and every step on our journey brings us closer to Easter, closer to hallelujah. The Holy Spirit equips us as Resurrection people to endure the Lenten struggle in order to reach Easter's freedom. This is our Good News! Easter is on the horizon, finally within view.

Look to Jesus. Jesus is our freedom and this freedom comes to us, faithfully. Jesus came to us 2,000 years ago as an infant in a manger. Jesus came to us on the cross where he became sin for all humanity. Jesus came to us on that Easter morning through the Resurrection, defeating death, hell, and the grave. And Jesus comes to us today and every day! Truly, I tell you, hallelujah is on the horizon!

#### Prophets of a Future Not Our Own

We are knee deep in the season of Lent. We find ourselves caught halfway between the longing for earlier days of peace and light in Epiphany on one side and on the other the glory of Easter morning. Yet here in the middle of our journey, we are captured by moments of struggle – wanting to be obedient to our Savior's call to follow but finding it difficult to see his footsteps in the shadows of Lent.

We spend a good amount of time looking to the end of the journey of Lent. Just get us to Easter morning. In the dawn of the resurrection of Jesus, let us hear the cries of Alleluia! God promises that we will, indeed, find ourselves outside an empty tomb come Easter morning. Yet, I am convinced that the joy of Easter is often difficult for us to grasp in the midst of our journeys in this life. A couple of days ago, I was reminded of the hymn entitled, "Lord Jesus, You Shall Be My Song."

Lord Jesus, you shall be my song as I journey. I'll tell everybody about you wherever I go: You alone are our life and our peace and our love. Lord Jesus, you shall be my song as I journey.

As long as I live, Jesus make me your servant, To carry your cross and to share all your burdens and tears. For you saved me by giving your body and blood. As long as I live, Jesus, make me your servant.

I fear in the dark and the doubt of my journey, But courage will come with the sound of your steps by my side. And with all of the family you saved by your love, We'll sing to your dawn at the end of our journey.

Our journey of faith is full of twists and turns, mountains and valleys, and often surprises that can be both unexpected moments of joy and shattering times of sadness. God allows all of it in this life. We live. We love. We learn. We walk this journey of faith without being able to see the outcome. Martin Luther King Jr. once said, "Faith is taking the first step, even when you don't see the whole staircase." I need that reminder in my life. I find myself needing to be reminded that God is the one leading this journey. God leads – I follow. The great challenge is in letting go of my own needs and want long enough to let God lead me where God invites me to go. This is my struggle and hope in this faith journey we call Lent.

#### Writes Bishop Ken Untener:

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view. The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us. No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the Church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything. This is what we are about. We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities. We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.

May we find God in this journey of faith. May we trust in the hope that is within us that calls us and leads us to the hope of Easter morning and the risen face of our Savior, Jesus, the Christ. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! (If just a little bit early!) See you in church. *Rev. Christian Marien*

#### Holy Week Happenings

ometimes I think we forget that our coming to church is less about us and more about God. When we gather as people of faith, God is present in our midst. Worship is the most important work of the church. The people of God exist to serve God. No higher service to God is possible than the worship of God. We can often get caught up in the "ways" in which we serve God. All are important. Worship, study, prayer, serving others – each is essential in our faith life if we are to grow in our relationship with God. Yet, worship leads us to the presence of God above all else. Our worship provides opportunity for us to respond to all that God has done, is doing, and will do in our lives. Even in times when the flame of our faith flickers in the storm, almost to the point of being extinguished, worship provides us place – anchoring us to the promise of God's love never leaving us. Worship is first and foremost a gift from God and our gift to God. During the last days of Lent as Holy Week begins with the joyful entry of our Savior into the gates of Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, our journey of faith leads us head on into the mystery of God's great love for us.

#### Palm Sunday, April 9

"Hosanna in the highest," will be our cry as we remember Jesus' triumphant entry into the gates of the holy city. We will celebrate the beginning of this holy week with the reminder that our expectations and God's expectations are not always exactly the same. Where the people want a powerful king, Jesus comes as a suffering servant riding a donkey.

Worship at our normal times at 8:30 and 10:45 a.m. with BLAST in -between services and First Communion celebrations and new members welcome at both services.

#### Maundy Thursday, April 13

We will gather in the upper room with Jesus and the disciples to celebrate the Last Supper. This year – the celebration of holy communion and the symbolism of foot washing will be central to our worship. As is tradition, we will honor the memory of Jesus' humiliation at the hands of those in power before he is led to the cross to be crucified by the stripping of the altar and our departure in silence.

#### Worship is at 7 p.m.

#### Good Friday, April 14

The ancient title for this day is "the Triumph of the Cross." A reminder for us that the church gathers not to mourn this day but to celebrate Christ's life-giving passion and to find strength and hope in the cross as a symbol of new life.

Worship is at noon when we will gather to remember the death of our Savior on the cross. Scripture, song, prayer, and silence will carry us through the holiness of this day as we enter into fully into the meaning of this day.

Presentation of the Passion of Jesus Christ is at 5 p.m. where our CRASH High School student ministry will continue the tradition of sharing the story of Jesus' last days through movement and music but without words.

Worship is at 7 p.m. where we will gather to bow before our God as God hangs on the cross. Our CRASH High School student ministry will present the passion of Jesus Christ and we will join those at the foot of the cross who know only an aching need to be present even as we are helpless to assist.

#### Easter Sunday, April 16

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First we hear only hoped for whispers on the wind. Resurrection? Are you sure? We gather to celebrate the resurrection of our Savior, Jesus, the Christ. Holy Communion and the glorious Easter songs of our faith will shape our worship.

Worship is at 6 a.m. - A new opportunity this year. A true sunrise service beginning in darkness and candlelight. We will join in the last whispers of Good Friday and hear the first words of resurrection, "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" This service will be intimate and peaceful in its beginning and end in joyful celebration.

Worship is at 8:30 and 10:45 a.m. with choirs, brass, praise band, and all the moments of celebration that call us to rejoice in the Resurrection of Jesus.



Instead we are encouraged to focus on the relationships we have with each other, relationships in which we both give and receive, speak and listen, and to share our lives in a spirit of mutual love and respect.

At Ascension, we talk about accompaniment in how we do mission work. It is the guiding force in how we define what we do and how we work together. You will be blessed by each day's thoughts on how we can truly walk with Jesus by walking with our neighbors both near and far. This should get them well into the summer depending on the weather. Kathy states: "We are so blessed by so many to partner with Hope Center." In addition to working with the wings, each council member will take a turn joining the counting teams. This will help us to better understand the process from beginning to end and will be beneficial when going through the budget process.




## Treasurer's Report
