

### GET TO KNOW THE ELCA

Because God has been good to us, we can share that goodness with others, and our church is an excellent vehicle to use. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is a four million member church that draws on our rich and vibrant faith that connects us to Lutherans all over the world. Our ministries throughout the nation and the world are extremely efficient and solidly ethical. The ELCA and 300 health and human service organizations participate in an alliance known as Lutheran Services in America, which serves more than six million people each year in the United States and the Caribbean. That's 1 in 50 Americans every year. That's HUGE! We Lutherans serve 1 in 50 Americans! As part of this alliance, we support more than 285 social ministry organizations affiliated with the ELCA. Chances are, if you want to start a ministry, the ELCA is already doing it!

The ELCA has so many ministries that there is no way I can list all that we do nationally and globally. So, let's begin with our home congregation. Through Ascension's Mission Outreach wing, we embrace our Companion Synods: Tanzania and El Salvador. Companion Synods are a concrete expression of our communion and fellowship with the 140 Lutheran churches of The Lutheran World Federation. There are 65 synods in the ELCA. Each synod has at least one international church companion. We are part of the Greater Milwaukee Synod; therefore, we embrace the relationships that the ELCA has prayerfully assigned to us. Ascension and Cross Lutheran have enjoyed a long history with El Salvador. In fact, churches in our area were instrumental in providing asylum for Salvadorans during their civil war. We also enjoy a deep and abiding relationship with Cross Lutheran in Milwaukee. Ascension focuses on our three partnerships and builds relationships that are mutually uplifting.

We belong to an amazing church that is active in the world. When people are facing a crisis or are at their most vulnerable, we respond with care and compassion, ready to serve and love our neighbor. Here are several examples of how we, the ELCA, serve God and the people of God (*descriptions taken from elca.org*). Pastor Angela Khabeb

#### **ELCA MALARIA CAMPAIGN**

A child dies from malaria every 60 seconds. But we are changing that grim statistic. Since the ELCA Malaria Campaign joined the global movement to fight malaria, we have seen a reduction in the number of deaths from this disease. But we're not done yet. We are committed to raising \$15 million by 2015 to support work in 13 of our companion churches in Africa. We are going to make malaria history!

#### **ELCA WORLD HUNGER**

More than 800 million people - that's 1 in 8 people in our world today - are chronically hungry and cannot lead active daily lives. Did you know that 1.2 billion people live in extreme poverty, living on less than \$1.25 per day? Or that in the United States, more than 50 million people do not know where their next meal will come from? Or that 46.2 million Americans are living in poverty. As members of the ELCA, we are called to respond. In 2012, our support of ELCA World Hunger totaled \$18.6 million. ELCA World Hunger supports projects and programs in 43 U.S. states; 56 countries (including the U.S.); 388 food pantries, homeless shelters and other projects in the U.S.; 239 sustainable development, health and other projects around the world; and 15 education and networking programs in the ELCA.

#### **HIV AND AIDS MINISTRY**

AIDS has claimed the lives of more than 25 million people worldwide. The ELCA, along with the international community, has pledged both resources and action.

#### LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

Lutheran Disaster Response brings God's hope, healing, and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, we stay to provide ongoing assistance to those in need. The ELCA is currently responding to U.S. flooding and fires; Middle East and Europe refugee crisis; the Nepal area earthquake; the Ebola outbreak; unaccompanied and migrant children, and the South Sudan conflict.



#### LUTHERAN IMMIGRATION AND REFUGEE SERVICE (LIRS)

We are a church that does God's work in the world and in local communities pursuing justice, peace, and human dignity for and with all people. In partnership with Lutheran congregations and Lutheran social ministry organizations, LIRS has welcomed more than 379,000 refugees to the United States since 1939. This ongoing partnership and work is driven by God's love for all people and a vision for congregations to be welcoming and generous centers for mission and ministry. Now, we are working to resettle immigrants from Syria.

#### **GLOBAL CHURCH**

We are a church that believes God is calling us into the world,

together. 70 million Lutherans do make a difference! As a member of The Lutheran World Federation, the ELCA is one of 142 member churches in 79 countries all over the world. Walking and working together, we seek to accompany our companions. Accompaniment

is defined as walking together in a solidarity that practices interdependence and mutuality. The ELCA lives out accompaniment in relationships with global companions in the following ways:

Mutually: All of us have gifts to support God's mission. There is no mission to, only mission with and among. Inclusively: We seek to build relationships across boundaries that exclude and divide. Vulnerably: Just as Jesus became vulnerable to us, we open ourselves to others. Empowering: We seek to identify and correct imbalances of power, which may mean recognizing and letting go of our own. Sustainably: To ensure local ministries last, we seek to embed mission in ongoing relationships and communities.

#### PUBLICLY ENGAGED CHURCH

We pursue justice and seek peace. Our faith and our call to boldly serve and love our neighbor take us into some interesting and challenging aspects of life: advocacy, corporate social responsibility, racial justice, science and ethics, peacemaking, justice for women, social issues, and community organizing. We are drawn into every corner of life, society and its institutions to bring the good news of Jesus Christ and to work for lasting, positive change that upholds human dignity.

Chances are, if you want to start a ministry, the ELCA is already doing it!

#### PEACE NOT WALLS

The ELCA is working for justice and peace in Palestine and Israel through our campaign, Peace Not Walls. Peace Not Walls connects ELCA members to our companions and promotes dignity, full respect for human rights, healing and reconciliation. With our Palestinian Lutheran companions, we also accompany Palestinians and Israelis, Jews, Christians and Muslims working together for peace with justice.

#### **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES**

There is a great need for your time and skills for doing God's work in the world. Locally, God is already doing great things through ELCA congregations, Lutheran social ministry organizations, and projects in our area. Check out our synod's website: <u>milwaukeesynod.org</u>. Nationally, there are a wealth

> of volunteer opportunities: ELCAaffiliated camps and retreat centers across the United States; Lutheran Disaster Response sites; Lutheran social ministry organizations; Mission Builders donate their time and technical know-how to help with construction of new churches.

There are also long-term service opportunities through Holden Village, Lutheran Volunteer Corps, Urban Servant Corps, and Border Servant Corps. We even have shortterm and long-term service opportunities around the world through ELCA Global Mission.

#### ECUMENICAL AND INTER-RELIGIOUS RELATIONS

The ELCA is not an island. We are committed to fostering unity among the children of God for the sake of the world. The ELCA Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Relations team cooperates with partners, such as The Lutheran World Federation, the World Council of Churches and the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA. Our Full Communion partners are the Episcopal Church, United Methodist Church, Moravian Church, Presbyterian Church (USA), Reformed Church in America, and United Church of Christ. We are dedicated to living out our baptismal calling to be light to the world. We serve our awesome God in amazing ways.

### LIVING FAITH

Dear People of God,

I take it as pure joy to be sitting outside in the middle of September relishing every moment of 72° and the delight of sunlight and blue skies. I know before too long, the days will announce fall with a new wind blowing and a fresh chill in the air. For now, we rejoice in the gift of the breeze coupled with the warmth of the sunshine to bring mums to bloom and one last ripened tomato from garden to table.

The beginning of fall programming in our congregation brings joy as well. So much to celebrate. So much offered from God's open hands. There is something for everyone. I am always stunned at the sheer amount of ministry happening in and through the community of Ascension.

Alongside my constant surprise at the number of active ministries moving in and through Ascension walks the almost unbelievable fact that Pastor Angela celebrates her first anniversary as pastor with us at Ascension. She is a gift in so many ways and brings a perspective to the congregation that deepens our understanding, strengthens our faith, and inspires our hearts. I am grateful for her presence among us.

It is no secret that our Children's Ministries have undergone a significant transformation over the past two months. Our Director of Faith Formation, Tony Acompanado, receives much of the credit for this transition along with the dedicated teachers who have taken a "leap of faith" in walking with our Children's Ministry in this inaugural year of newness. So far so good. We have spent a good deal of time redefining our Children's Ministry in the light of experience.

In these days of ministry, I often ask this question, "What does it mean for faith to come alive?" Answers to that question are all around us. However, one moment has stood out, for me, more than any other. In the midst of our Kindergarten Stepping Stone, we revised our activities to make everything we do hands-on. Our kindergarten students had a blast. Playdough brought the story of Noah's Ark to life. Legos helped to explain the story of Solomon building the temple. Finger paint and candied gel decoration taught the students about the moment where Jesus spoke of himself as the vine and all of us as the branches. Forty-five minutes flew by. Before we knew it, class was over. The best part for me was sharing with the parents and students an opportunity to bless each other at home with the sign of the cross. It may sound simplistic – perhaps it is. And yet, for me, it is pure joy to link playdough and Legos and paint to the stories of our faith. This new stepping stone was like sunlight and blue skies all rolled into one moment of watching parents and students share a moment around the living Word of God. I can't wait for what's next!

#### MANAGING GOD'S BLESSINGS, GOD'S WAYS, FOR GOD'S GLORY

**God's Blessings –** The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it (Psalm 24:1). When we realize that everything we have comes from God, it changes our perspective. Owners fight to keep what they have and strive to obtain more for themselves. Managers use what they have been given to obtain the best benefit for the owner, and they receive a reward for a job well done.

**God's Ways** – No one can serve two masters. Either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Money (Matthew 6:24). The world focuses first and foremost on self-fulfillment and self-gratification. God asks us to be generous servants of others' needs. In fulfilling the needs of others, we become fulfilled. True contentment can only be found in God.

**God's Glory –** In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven (Matthew 5:16). When we seek to glorify God rather than glorify ourselves, we take another step toward becoming more like Christ. Worldly glory may last for a moment, yet God's glory lasts forever.

As we enter fall, many people view financial pledging and giving as stewardship. Hopefully the information above will help us understand that giving is not stewardship, giving is something a good steward does. Stewardship is about how we handle our entire Christian life, not just our finances. As we learn how our Lutheran lens shapes how we see and understand the scriptures, also consider how our Lutheran lens shapes how we live out our faith through our actions.

### **CARE MINISTRIES UPDATES**

We have so much to be thankful for this season with our Ascension Care Ministries. We have been blessed with wonderful programs that have helped to enrich the lives of many. In June and August, we held three Red Cross Babysitting classes at Ascension and certified a total of 28 teens. The classes were fun, interactive, and instructed the teens to handle very important life skills in caring for children. We will teach these classes again next summer.

Currently, Ascension has three programs providing care and support for people in the midst of turmoil and grief.

**GriefShare** is for those who have suffered the loss of a loved one. Pastor Angela facilitates, and we have 10-12 active participants. Many of these people find comfort by connecting with others that are grieving and experiencing God's presence through their difficult times.

**DivorceCare** is a new ministry for those that are dealing with the effects of a divorce. Kathy Kuhn facilitates, and we have about six participants that attend. This ministry offers support to a group of people that feel like their lives have been turned upside down. This faith-based program gives them tools to help put their lives back together.

**DivorceCare 4 Kids** focuses on children. Pamela Hamm, a psychotherapist, facilitates. We have 10 children registered ranging in age. These children struggle with the effects of divorce. Many struggle with anxiety, school issues, and are happy to be with other children who share common experiences and stresses. DC4K is a "safe place" to share their feelings. These children can feel isolated during divorce, and this program helps children learn that they are never alone with God in their lives.

So many people are suffering with grief and loss. Families are fractured and broken in divorce. As well as accommodating our members in need, Care Ministries has reached out into the community and invited many people from outside our church into our walls for these programs. Our thanks to volunteers who have made meals for our programs and for the members who have contributed to the *Adopt A Child* fundraiser!

Care Ministries extends gratitude Bill Rudd as he steps down from his Pastoral Assistant role. Bill has been a wonderful, kind, and caring Pastoral Assistant to countless members of our Ascension family for the past 13-14 years.

Care Ministries thanks Nada Draeger as she steps down as the leader of our Respite Ministry. Nada implemented Respite from a passion she had and she was able to help members in our congregation that struggled with care-giving needs.

### HOMEBOUND MINISTRY: FORGET ME NOT

## Each month, Care Ministries will highlight the biography of a homebound Ascension member.

When you see Ethel Dehnart at Ascension on a Sunday, it will more than likely be at the 10:45 service. With her will be her daughter Bev Janke, who faithfully sees that her mom gets to church. (You may also spot them at Taco Johns on Taco Tuesday).

Ethel was 94 on May 15, 2015. She was born Ethel Bahr, the oldest of 11 children of a tenant farming family. In 1939, she graduated from Waukesha High School and went to work the lunch counter at the Walgreens on the Five Points. For many years, it was a gathering place right in the heart of a busy downtown Waukesha.

Soon Roy Dehnert came calling, and the two were married in 1943. They raised three children, Bey, David, and John. Ethel's two sons live in the south now, and last January, Bev and Ethel flew down to see them. When the children were youngsters, the family moved to the house on Pine Street, where Ethel still lives.

Ethel and Roy joined Ascension when it was a little start-up church on Fairview Ave. Ethel taught Sunday school for 10 years, started a phone ministry, and, until a few years ago, led a small group Bible study. She remembers Gert Ullsberger and Loretta and Haskill Reichert being regular members at that time too. They did everything that needed to get done at the fledgling church, from cleaning to setting communion, to cooking, to singing in the choir. The congregation was small then and "everybody just pitched in and made it happen."

After the children were in school, Ethel went back to school too. She studied accounting at WCTC for two years. Much earlier, when she was a teenager, she dreamed of going to college, but, it being the depression era, all available resources went to simple survival. "People just can't understand how tough those times were unless you lived it."

Ethel is a gifted artist. She has painted oils and watercolors; she writes poems and stories and plays the organ and accordion. One of her first efforts was a pamphlet she wrote at the age of 8 that she called "Scribbles." Over the years she has written many poems and a children's book "Where's My Moo" which she coauthored with her sister. She also wrote a book for Lent that was used at Ascension. Ethel's framed paintings decorate the walls of her home but they are not for sale. (Don't even ask!) She was able to describe each piece, and she remembers where she was when she painted it. An organ is an important part of her living room. She never took lessons, so she always plays by ear.

Two strokes have taken much of Ethel's eyesight "and a chunk out of [her] middle." She keeps a tidy house and makes her meals with Bev's help. These days her joy comes from listening to most any kind of music. She also loves to tend her flower garden and watch the wildlife and birds in her yard. She still occasionally plays her organ, locating the melodies by feel and with her musical ear.

How lucky we are at Ascension to have Ethel Dehnart and her daughter Ben Janke in our midst! They bring a rich heritage and a love of the Lord into our lives most every single Sunday of the year. Praise God for their lives.

### A TASTE OF THE DANIEL PLAN

WHY? Do you ever wonder why you do something? Why do you choose to go to work every morning? Is it because you need to support your family financially? Is it because you like the activities you perform every day? Is it because you like the affirmation you receive from your peers? Why do you come to church every Sunday? Is it because you imagine there is someone standing at the parking lot entrance taking attendance? Is it because you want to foster a deeper relationship with the Lord? Or could it be, you just like coming to hang with some friends and drink some coffee?

*Why* is a big question in the decisions we make living our lives. Take for instance choosing to live a healthy lifestyle or not. Unfortunately, all too many of us today choose not to attempt to lead a healthy lifestyle. We've heard the plethora of reasons: not enough time, too expensive, my kids/spouse don't think healthy food tastes good, I don't like to exercise....

*Why* is really just another word for *motivation* So what would it take to motivate you to move toward living a healthier lifestyle?
