DAYS OF LIGHT

What joy to celebrate the birth of our Savior once again in these Christmas days. It always fills me with wonder and awe to see the body of Christ gather to sing the old songs while experiencing the story and love of God in new ways through the journey of Advent darkness to Christmas light. Even as the world often does not know what to do with the birth of our Savior, you and I hear the call of God to be witnesses to the light of God coming into the world.



Now we find ourselves on the edge of the season of Epiphany – the season of light. I am filled with peace in these days of light - each day a reminder of God's presence in my life and in the life of the world. When we see the difficult and painful realities of our world, our hope in Jesus gives us strength to face the days before us.

Some of us are experiencing a broken relationship; some of us are living with the consequences of a decision made long ago; some of us are afraid to reach out to someone in need; some of us are wondering how we will get through one more day; and some of us are fearful of the seemingly downward spiral of a world in turmoil. Through all of these fears and worries, the light of God in Jesus Christ shines chasing away the dark night of our fear.

Our invitation is to trust God and follow God from the manger to the temple to the River Jordan to the healing and saving work of God on the cross and through the gate of death to the other side of the empty tomb. The old Norwegian hymn, *I Am So Glad Each Christmas Eve* reminds us of God's promise.

I am so glad each Christmas Eve, the night of Jesus' birth!
Then like the sun the star shone forth, and angels sang on earth.
The little child in Bethlehem, he was a king indeed!
For he came down from heaven above to help a world in need.

He came down from heaven above to help a world in need. This is not a future promise to God's creation, it is a promise already fulfilled. Thanks be to God! In our daily lives, our invitation is to trust what God is doing because of what God has already done. Now there is a promise fulfilled that I can take comfort in during challenging days.

After the Advent Concert Worship weekend, a member of the congregation sent a reflection to the office. I found her words full of the faith we are invited to engage trusting that God is at work in the world. Here are her words.

When I attended the Christmas concert on Dec. 13, I was so moved by [the] production and message I received of Christ's coming to earth to be among us, I felt I had to say something about it. We had the children singing to the glory of God, the choir at its best singing the joy to the world, instrumentalists playing, the Bell Choir ringing their hearts to God, the Folk Choir singing, and Ben and the Praise Band singing for us. The message Pastor Angela read to us was the message that means Christmas to me. I was overwhelmed with joy. As I sat there, I pondered the budget cuts and the many changes in our church in the past several years and I feel that our church is going in the right direction. There is no way we can make changes for the future without stepping on someone's toes. Unfortunately someone gets hurt.

My prayer for 2016 at Ascension is that we all can work together and we can find ways to make up the shortfalls in our budget. We all need to listen to our Lord who speaks to us through the holiday season and all year. Remember my favorite Bible verse, I can do anything through Christ who gives me strength.' What I appreciate most about Arlene's words is her unwavering trust in God. In the midst of worship and praise of our God, Arlene saw the light of a manger overflowing with God's love for a world in need. THE POWER OF SMALL GROUPS

But you are the ones chosen by God, chosen for the high calling of priestly work, chosen to be a holy people, God's instruments to do his work and speak out for him, to tell others of the night-and-day difference he made for you—from nothing to something, from rejected to accepted. ~ 1 Peter 2:9-10

Attending a larger church has many wonderful ministry opportunities. However, it may be difficult to get to know people and create lasting friendships. And that is why I love small group ministry! Small group ministry offers us the wonderful possibility of growing closer to members of our church family. In other words, small group ministry is one of the most important building blocks in church relationships. I have personally experienced the power of small groups. When I was younger, a classmate invited me to her youth group. I accepted her invitation and soon found myself attending an amazing, vibrant youth ministry with nearly 300 youth and young adults. This youth group was part of an even larger congregation. Given this type of church setting, it was challenging to get to know people on a deeper level. That was when I discovered the power of small group ministry. I regularly attended a small group near my home and through that experience, I was able to grow spiritually and develop lifelong friends.

Currently, Ascension has an amazing and vital ministry opportunity available. Although Ascension already has a committed and creative small group ministry team in place, we are seeking a new small group coordinator. This lay leader will work with the small group team and help provide oversight for the Fall and Lenten campaigns. The congregation-wide campaigns are an excellent opportunity for us all to grow in God and to grow closer to one another. I certainly want this vital facet of small groups to continue. We are excited for a new leader to embrace this essential ministry role. Our small group coordinator will be someone who is excited about learning more about God and growing spiritually.

In 1 Peter, we learn that we are connected to Jesus who is our rock, the living stone. In fact, we discover that Jesus has now become our head cornerstone. Likewise, we are also stones --building materials to be used by God. Therefore, St. Peter encourages us to present ourselves as building stones for the construction of a ministry that is vibrant with life in which we all serve as holy priests. Martin Luther talks about the *priesthood of all believers* because that is precisely what God's word teaches us.

One of the ways we offer ourselves as stones, as building materials for God's kingdom, is through active church leadership. St. Peter tells us that we are chosen to be a holy people, to be God's instruments and to do God's work. He also encourages us to tell others about the difference that God has made in our lives. Sisters and brothers, we are *a royal priesthood*. That means that the ministry of the body of Christ does not solely belong to the pastors for we are all ministers. We are all priests -- offering ourselves to be stones that can help the ministry of Ascension and give life and encouragement to the rest of the body of Christ.

Perhaps the Holy Spirit is calling you to be part of the small groups ministry team? Perhaps the Holy Spirit is calling you, inviting you to become the new small groups coordinator? Perhaps God is calling you to continue to serve Ascension and God's people?




In January, we prepare our blacklight performance for Children's Ministry. With the darkness of winter, it is fun to bring this special light to tell stories and praise God.

BLOOD DRIVE

Ascension is hosting a blood drive on Saturday, Jan. 30, from 8 a.m.-12 p.m., in West Hall. Register at www.bcw.edu/Ascension for an appointment or feel free to walk in!

Blood donation is important to many people, including children like six-year-old Finn Olson, son of Ascension members Heather and Lars Olson. Finn's parents learned about his *broken heart* even before he was born. After birth, Finn endured three open heart surgeries for his congenital heart disease and required numerous units of blood. "He wouldn't have lived through his first week without the blood he began receiving shortly after birth. God bless these people who probably didn't realize they were saving a child's life. They didn't ask, they just gave," Heather remembers thinking as she watched the new units of blood being placed on his IV pole. Today, Finn still receives treatment and will someday need a heart transplant. Let Finn's story about his *broken heart* fill your heart. Please consider donating on Jan. 30.

Blood is the essence of life and to give selflessly can make you feel more connected to your community and to the world around you. It's a fulfilling, powerful, and enriching experience to know that your donation could save lives. To donate, you need to:

- Be at least 17 years old (16-year-olds may donate with parental consent)
- Weigh at least 110 lbs
- Feel well on day of donation
- Be free of major cold and flu symptoms
- Present a photo ID with birth date
- Not have had hepatitis after age 11 years
- Not have had any risk factors/behaviors associated with HIV/AIDS
- Most medications are acceptable. For a list of unacceptable medications, please visit the Blood Center's website: www.bcw.edu.
- Antibiotics: You can donate three days after finishing antibiotics for an infection (bacterial
 or viral). You can donate if you are taking antibiotics to prevent an infection, for example,
 following dental procedures or for acne. Antibiotics for acne do not disqualify you from
 donating.
- Dental work: You can donate if there is no infection.
- Flu vaccination: You can donate if you are feeling well.
- Heart disease: Most donors with a history of heart disease that are feeling well and do not have
 any restrictions may be eligible to donate. Please be prepared to discuss your specific condition
 with a Donor Specialist.
- Infections: You must be infection-free.
- Injections/Vaccinations: Certain injections and vaccinations require a wait before donating. Please bring the name of the injection or vaccination and the date it was administered.
- Menstruation: Women can donate during their periods.
- Piercings: Ear or body piercing using single-use, sterile equipment is acceptable.
- Pregnancy: Women who are pregnant should not donate. Please wait to donate until 6 weeks after giving birth. Women who are breast-feeding are eligible to donate.
- Tattoos: Restrictions concerning tattoos have changed. If your tattoo was applied by a licensed
 facility in Wisconsin, you can donate blood. If your tattoo was applied by an unlicensed facility
 or a facility outside Wisconsin, we require a 12-month waiting period from the time the tattoo
 was applied.
- Travel: If you have traveled to a malaria area, you may not donate until 12 months after your return.
- Cancer: Certain cancers require a 5-year wait after treatments. Please be prepared to discuss
 your specific type of cancer with a Donor Specialist.

Unfortunately, fewer than 5% of people who are eligible to donate actually do. Imagine the lives that could be touched by your gift. It's a quick, simple, and amazing way to give back to our community!



THE HEALTHY AGING BRAIN

The U.S. population is aging quickly and we are living longer than ever before. A tremendous threat to the health and well-being of all older Americans is Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. On Jan. 17, from 9:30-10:30 a.m, Brenda Lytle, RN will discuss signs and symptoms, risk factors, and the search for treatments after the diagnosis of these dementias. This in-service is an evidence-based, medical outreach program created by the GrapeVine Project with the Wisconsin Health Foundation.

A TASTE OF THE DANIEL PLAN

The holidays have come and gone. How did you fare? Were you one of the average Americans that gained 7 - 10 pounds over the holiday season? It's not surprising when you consider the amount of sugar people consume, especially over the holidays. Most Americans are truly addicted to sugar. It is said that a sugar addiction is harder to break than a cocaine addiction.

It is no wonder. Sugar is in everything...and in outrageous proportions! Most people only think about the white sugar they bake with or perhaps throw in their coffee or on their cereal. That is only the beginning. Go to your cabinets right now and take out a couple of items. Read the labels. Each one probably contains sugar or one or more of the "sugars" contained within the following list. (This, by the way, is only about half of the alternate names for sugar.)

Barley Malt Date Sugar High-Fructose Corn Syrup Raw Sugar Beet Sugar Dextran Honey (natural) Refiner's Syrup Brown Sugar Dextrose Icing Sugar Rice Syrup Cane Juice Crystals Fructose Lactose Sorbitol Cane Sugar Fruit Juice Maltodextrin Sorghum Syrup (natural) Caramel Fruit Juice Concentrate Maltose Sucralose (Splenda) Corn Syrup Glucose Malt Syrup Sucrose Glucose Solids Sugar Corn Syrup Solids Maple Syrup (natural) Confectioner's Sugar Golden Sugar Molasses Turbinado Sugar Carob Syrup Grape Sugar Muscovado Sugar Yellow Sugar

The Daniel Plan refers to sugar as the *white menace*. When sugar enters your body, it triggers a cascade of changes in your body that make you sick and fat. Here's what happens: You ingest sugar or refined carbs like white flour or pasta. Your blood sugar spikes. Your insulin levels spike. Insulin triggers the storage of belly fat and increases your appetite and sugar cravings. This leads to overeating and obesity which unleashes a host of other problems.

This New Year, make it your resolution to make a conscious effort to reduce sugar in your diet. (Don't switch to artificial sweeteners.) We recently wrapped up a 6 week Daniel Plan study in Dec. We treated the participants to a "treat" every week. Nothing contained a grain of sugar. Ask any of the group members and they will tell you they had no problem enjoying what we brought. Thought for 2016: Read your labels!

4 MINUTE CHICKEN

Ingredients

1 large chicken breast cut Skinny Chicken style (medallions)

2 T coconut oil (or olive oil if you cook on medium low heat)

1 1/2 tsp. all-purpose seasoning

1 cup asparagus, sliced very thin on a bias

1 cup mushrooms, sliced very thin

Sea salt & pepper, to taste

Preparation:

In a bowl, combine coconut oil and all purpose seasoning. Add chicken medallions and massage well, coating the chicken evenly. In a hot skillet, place chicken in pan, cover and let cook 2 minutes. Turn chicken over. Cover chicken with asparagus and mushrooms. Cover pan and cook 2 minutes. Season to taste with sea salt and pepper. Serve. Optional: Zucchini, onions, tomatoes and most easy to cook vegetables work well with this recipe.

MOUNT MERU MEDICAL MINISTRY

Did you know that one of the ministries of the Mount Meru Diocese is a hospital? The Greater Milwaukee Synod is one of the major sponsors of this important project. The hospital has fallen on difficult times in recent years, and in an effort to improve efficiency and quality of care, the Diocese has hired a hospital administrator from Belgium. In addition to her professional abilities, this administrator has spent a considerable amount of time volunteering at the Diocese's hospital, so she brings many experiences to this position.

One of the consequences of the hospital's troubles has been that the doctors and nurses have been working without pay. Although the monthly salary for a nurse is \$250 and \$600 for a doctor, the Diocese has struggled to pay even these meager salaries. Donations to the Meru Diocese's hospital not only allow people living in poverty to receive medical care, but also provides employment to Tanzanian doctors and nurses, giving a much needed boost to the local economy. CONFRONTING RACISM: A HOLY YEARNING

Racism remains an enduring crisis in the United States. As Lutheran Christians, we must continue our involvement in and commitment to the important work of naming racism as a $\sin - a$ violation of God's intention for humanity.

WHERE DOES MY OFFERING GO?

A significant portion of Ascension's Mission Outreach budget goes to the national church, the Evangelical Church in America. In 2014, members of nearly 10,000 congregations in the United States and Caribbean gave \$1.8 billion in regular offerings to support ELCA ministries. When members give through their congregations, a percentage of that money is then shared with the local synod and the national churchwide organization. Of the \$1.8 billion total, the churchwide organization received \$48.4 million, or 2.8 percent of the total regular offerings to ELCA congregations in 2014. This represents the largest portion of the ELCA churchwide organization's current operating budget of \$70.5 million, which includes additional income from investments, bequests and trusts, grants, and certain designated offerings.

In 2014, 27 percent of this amount went towards growing the church in the US by:

- Planting and supporting 340 new congregations
- Enabling congregations to renew their ministries and reach out to their surrounding communities
- Working together with our African Descent, American Indian and Alaska Native, Arab and Middle Eastern, Asian and Pacific Islander, and Latino/Latina members to develop networks and resources for ministry
- Developing and sharing resources for faith, discipleship, prayer, and worship
