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
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PASTOR'S PERSPECTIVE



Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

A couple of years ago this reflection ran across my desk:

"Out of the stale darkness, he rises into the light, bright rays of sun split *the tops of trees, and clouds depart and blue fills sky – the smell of angels* lingers in the air – his hair feels the cool breeze again. This was not the garden, but a new world made from the eruption of hope and a life that could not be held down.

We were witnesses to the life that rose from the dead. God's relentless love, who comes close to us moving stones from tombs opening the heart to another possibility, death no longer stands. My heart races in my chest

as I step forward to face the future, my future, that I grasp with open hands with new naiveté, a child toward a mother to be held and lifted up, and cradled with care. At times I hesitate and I grasp onto memories of what once was but I know that I am not alone in my apprehension. I feel the hands of others holding me. These are my sisters, my brothers, who are not strangers to my fears and frailties, who have also confronted a hope that frightens them – who can feel their own scars, both fresh and old, they step in pace with me – the weeping women at the gravesite, the scared disciples waiting in the upper room.

This is our future, where we walk together toward our new home built by the hands of a wounded king – the new Zion, forsaking the kingdoms marked by boarders and divides where all our settlements are only temporary shelters, sanctuaries of rest for the wounded and weary. Then the Christ returns to visit us, as Galilee's boats pull to shore, these places seem familiar – the lapping water and the sand, but we are not to return to these lands, nor those dreams – but become pilgrims, to set our belongings in another home, to wash our sandy feet in some other place, to lay down our tired souls on a distant promise, quilted from both the today and the tomorrow.

And we dine as a day sees another setting sun sitting across from each other once again – seeing each sweet face laughing deeply feeling whole once more. And we see the Savior's smile, he knows our journey's end and pours us another cup full of his own love and this time, our eyes tell him that we understand."

Welcome to the season of Easter. I, for one, am grateful to be here. Although I am grateful for the season of Lent, I often feel like maybe we linger just a little too long in the season and in so doing our souls begin to wander and languish. But the promise and joy of our God is that our God does not leave us to wander for long before we are met with the surprise and joy of the empty tomb. Resurrection, my friends! It is what we are about in these Easter days and what we share with the world. Resurrection – death-crushing, impossible, unbelievable, soul-quenching resurrection. Joy out of sorrow. Life out of death. Thanks be to God!

May God bless you richly in these Easter days and may you see resurrection ever about you.

Understanding the Symbolism of the Latino Alfombras (Carpets)

During Holy Week, the Latino Ministry led the effort to bring a Central American Holy Week tradition to the Spanish sanctuary and the narthex. In Central America, these carpets would created directly on the pavement of the main streets in town, but we used plywood as a base to protect the actual carpet. The sawdust was donated by Bliffert and was colored ahead of time using fabric dye purchased with a grant from Thrivent.

Here is some of the symbolism behind these carpets.

Alfombras are a bookend to Palm Sunday. On Palm Sunday, Jesus enter Jerusalem on at path of cloaks and palms; the alfombras beautify his walk to the cross.

As Jesus walked to the cross on Good Friday, the procession walks on the alfombras, destroying the artwork on their way to the altar. As Jesus dies, the world becomes an uglier place for three days, so the beauty of the alfombras comes to an end. It is also symbolic of the tearing of the curtain in the temple.

Alfombras are traditionally made primarily with sawdust and enhanced with salt and sand. Salt is mentioned over forty times in the Bible. Sand represents both the earth and Jesus' connection to the sea and fisherman. Sawdust is used because Jesus was the son of a carpenter. It also reminds us of the passage from Genesis that we are from dust and we will return to dust.

Twiddlemuffs: Knit Wits Helping People with Dementia & Alzheimer's

Ascension's Knit Wits make "twiddlemuffs" and donate them to the ADRC for distribution. Then, the ADRC distributes the twiddlemuffs to individuals with dementia during home visits and/or at Memory Café's for them to keep and use at home, in the car or wherever they would like to take them.

Thanks to the generosity of Asension's Knit Wits, it is estimated that over 100 twiddlemuffs have been distributed to individuals with dementia in Waukesha County, according to the ADRC.

Here's why twiddlemuffs are helpful:

A twiddlemuff is a knitted or crocheted tube with accessories, such as ribbons, strings, buttons or beads sewn on to them. They usually have multiple textures, with different things sewn on the inside and outside of the muff. This allows for the person's hands to stay warm while they "twiddle" with the accessories. The twiddlemuffs provide stimuli for the hands to keep them busy, often providing a positive effect of calmness and comfort, as well as movement and brain stimulation. The twiddlemuffs also help people stay warm. As people age, they may find that their hands and feet get cold easier. There are a number of reasons why this feeling of cold may be happening, whether medical, age-related or environmental. People with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias may not be able to tell us that their hands are cold. Figuring out what the individual needs can be a challenging situation and one that many caregivers have had to work through. One solution is to provide the individual with a twiddlemuff. GMS SYNOD: Lutheran Campus Ministry

These young people are strong in faith and guided by God's love and are ready to go into the world and lead. We are excited as our plans are coming together for our summer trip to visit our sister parishes in El Salvador. We will be involved with some exciting environmental sustainability projects, working and learning side by side with our brothers and sisters from San Jorge. We will be learning about the Lutheran World Relief cocoa project and exploring ways we can work together to expand that project to benefit the people of San Jorge. Along the way, we'll visit projects Ascension has sponsored along the years: the dedication of the new land for the Usulután church, visiting the hardware stores, and seeing all of the BLAST goats. PARTNERSHIP NEWS: Tanzania

Our brothers and sisters from Tanzania are entering their third month of drought. Please keep them in your prayers. On our visit in the summer of 2018, we learned that sending the money for our school meal program in the fall wasn't a good fit for a culture where food costs fluctuate greatly depending on the time of the year. When we sent the money in the fall, \$6000 fed half of the school children. By sending the money earlier, we were able to feed all of the children for a little over \$3000. We will find out soon how the drought is impacting costs this year.


Tanzania & El Salvador Mission Trip Dinner

The Beginnings of Ascension

History is one of those subjects either people love or hate. If you're one that hates history you may want to skim these few paragraphs. But if you have a little interest in the story of Ascension you may want to stick around for a few more words. Trust me there will not be a test at the end of this history lesson, just a surprise quiz.

Ascension will be 70 years old this coming September. Our church was born on the eleventh of that month on the western outskirts of the City of Waukesha. Not where the church stands now but on Madison Street and Fairview Avenue, a few blocks away. We were not large, but we filled a great need at that time. World War II had ended only a scant four years prior to our birth. Service men and women were being wed and beginning to raise families at one of the highest rates the United States has ever seen. And those men and women needed God. Most people do after seeing and feeling war like everyone did. So God filled the need and brought together a small group that gave birth to Ascension Lutheran Church

Now Waukesha was a lot different back in 1949 than it is today. Just west of Moreland Road stood nothing but open fields and dairy farms as far as Genesee Depot. Dopp subdivision, the homes that surround our wonderful church right now, had just been commissioned but not a home had been raised yet, and you could still catch the trolley in downtown, or take the train into Milwaukee.

Waukesha was just over 21,000 people, mostly to the east of the Fox River or on the cliff side to the west. You had your choice of three movie theaters in town: The Pix, The Park and The Avon, and you still had to go to the butcher for meat, the bakery for your bread, milk was delivered, and your other necessities came from Schultz Brothers, Woolworth or the Metropolitan. You were well off financially if you made over \$4,000 a year and a new 5-room ranch home would have cost you \$8,900.

If you would have picked up the Sunday Milwaukee Sentinel (The Freeman didn't publish on Sundays in 1949) on the day Ascension came to be, the three biggest headlines you would have payed attention too in the 201 page paper would have been, "The Future of Heating Will Be Natural Gas," "The Brewers Have Beat the Saints to Clinch Third Place" (that's the St. Paul. Minnesota Saints), and "Green Bay to Play an Exhibition Game ... Against Their Rivals the New York Bull Dogs, in Rock Island Illinois."



As we celebrate our Easter season, I want to continue to share with you activities of your council, with our themes for this year being promoting congregational health and wellness, increasing engagement experiences, and strengthening council leadership.

Ascension and the City of Waukesha recently partnered for an election on April 2. We had 975 community members come through our doors to vote and see Having knowledgeable and experienced people in leadour church and sanctuary. There were positive comments from voters who preferred our site to the previous voting site at Bethesda Elementary School; we had election staff who had positive things to say about working at Ascension as an election site; we had City of Waukesha election leadership who valued our partnership; and our Ascension staff had good election experiences as well. After discussion at our recent council meeting, we decided to have Ascension be an election site for 2020. This will involve four election dates next year and we think this is an excellent way for us to engage our community. If you are interested or have Mary Ellen Comp and Jeremy Poling are overseeing questions about becoming an election worker as a way for you to *engage* in an Ascension activity, please let me know so that I can get you connected with the Waukesha City Clerk for training.

An issue that your Council began discussing this month is the need this year to revise the church constitution. We need to bring our constitution in line with the national ELCA Constitution which is revised every three years following the church-wide Assembly; this

gathering will be occurring in Milwaukee from August 5-10, 2019. If you are interested in *engaging* with our Ascension Constitution Revision Project please let me know. I would also ask you to join me and consider engaging with the ELCA church-wide Assembly as they will need many volunteer staff to make this a successful event.

One of my observations has been that each year Ascension loses a person with important church knowledge and skills when the President completes their term and leaves church leadership. As a way to strengthen Council leadership the Council has endorsed setting up a Past Presidents Group which we hope will be a resource for your Council.
